Staff Recommendation:

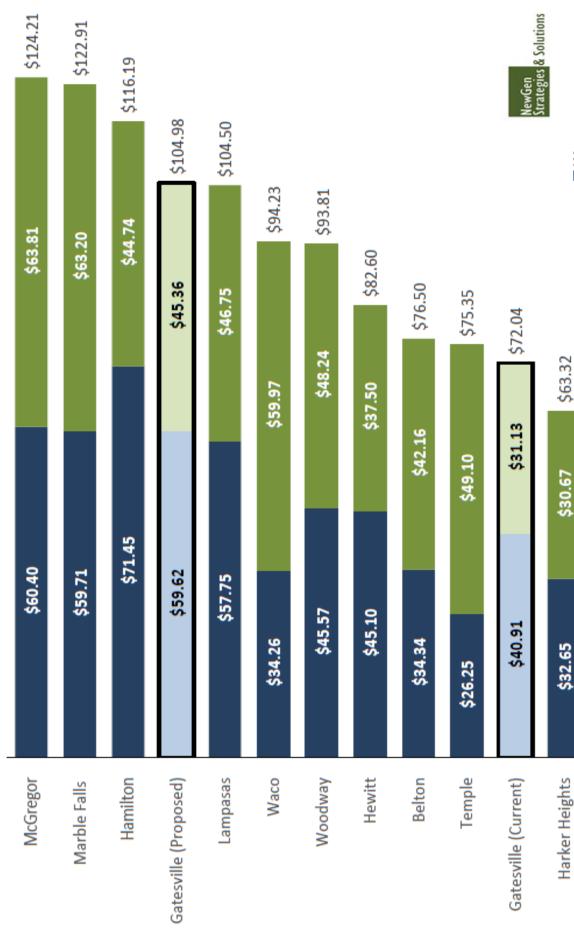

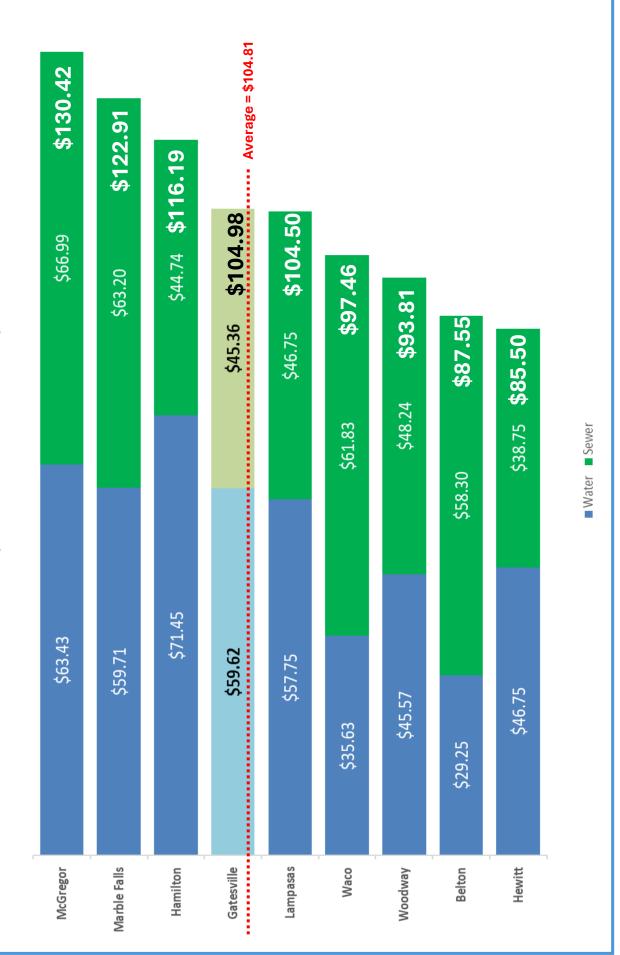
Combined Regional Bill Comparison

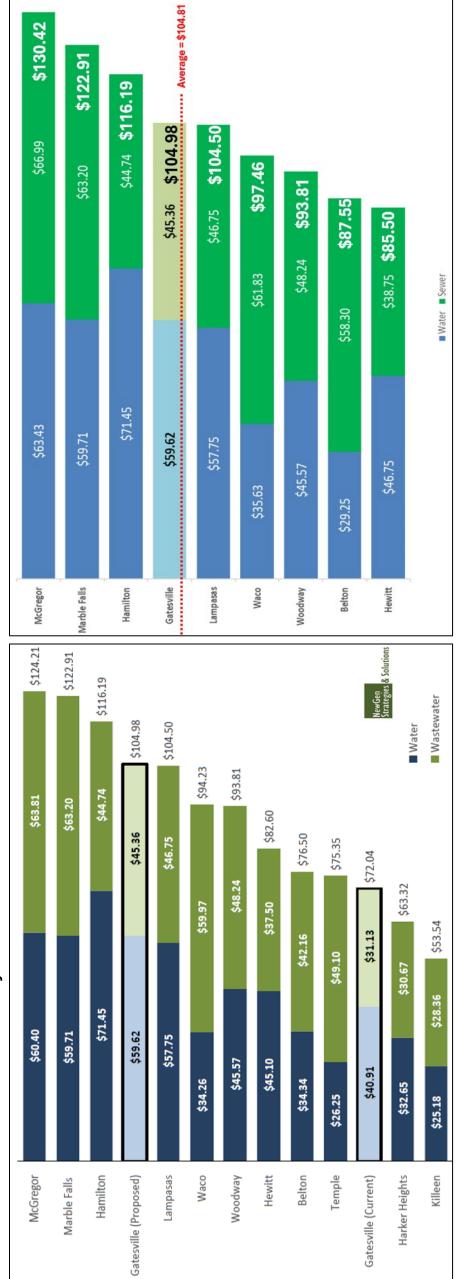

Agenda Item: Discussion and possible action regarding award for engineering services RFQ

2026-1, related to EPA 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (PL118-42) funded

project CG - 02F95501-0.

Information:

The city received notification after application to the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2024 Congressionally Directed Project funding that it was eligible for funding. The total project budget is \$582,500 based upon an 80/20 grant. The City of Gatesville received a maximum award of \$466,000 for the purpose of a Wastewater Main Replacement project. The city has identified an 1100-foot section of 10-inch gravity sewer main along Highway 36 that needs replaced and expanded to a 12-inch line. The line connects a manhole that is nearing capacity to a 12-inch sewer line. In June of 2024 the city was notified that it was invited to apply for the grant from EPA, complete federal pre-award requirements such as the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and then receive the award. The necessary actions were taken by staff to move the grant forward to the next phase of procuring engineering services for the project. RFQ 2026-1 was advertised for engineering services and closed October 20, 2025, 3:00 PM. Five firms submitted responses: WTC, TRC, SPI, KPA and MRB Group. Staff (Brad Hunt, Mike Halsema, Chad Newman) evaluated the RFQ's and scored KPA as the highest. Results in the table below:

Request for Qualifications for Engineering Services

The City of Gatesville is seeking to enter into an **engineering services** contract with a State of Texas-registered engineer to assist with engineering services of its EPA 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (PL118-42) funded project CG – 02F95501-0EPA gravity sewer main replacement project

The following outlines this Request for Qualifications.

- I. Scope of Work: The engineering contract will encompass all project-related engineering services to the City, including but not limited to the following:
 - Preliminary and final design plans and specifications
 - Bid and Award Support
 - Contract Management and Construction Oversight including all field testing and inspections (interim and final) in compliance with Federal EPA grant guidelines.
 - Construction closeout
 - Other special services

*Please specify actual tasks to be performed under each of these categories.

- II. Statement of Qualifications: The city is seeking to contract with a competent engineering firm, registered to practice in the State of Texas. Please provide the following information:
 - Brief history of the proposing entity, including general background, knowledge of and experience working with the relevant agency
 - Related experience in applying for federally funded construction projects
 - A description of work performance and experience with EPA grant projects including a list of at least 3 references from past local government clients
 - A statement substantiating the service provider's resource and the ability to carry out the scope of work requested in a timely manner
 - Describe the service providers capacity to perform as well as resumes of all employees who will or may be assigned to provide services if your firm is awarded a contract through this solicitation
- III. Proposed Cost of Services: The City of Gatesville reserves the right to negotiate with any and all engineers/engineering firms that submit statement of qualifications, per the Texas Professional Services Procurement Act and the Uniform Grant and Contract Management Standards.
- IV. Evaluation Criteria: Proposals received will be evaluated and ranked according to the following criteria:

The City of Gatesville will score and rank all eligible respondents. The City will negotiate a contract with the highest scoring respondent. If a contract cannot be reached, then the City will move down the list until a contract can be agreed upon. The City will issue a task order for the identified Scope of work.

V. Submission Requirements

- A copy of your current certificate of insurance for professional liability.
- A statement of conflicts (if any) the proposing entity or key employees may have regarding these services. The statement should include conflicts, as well as any working relationships that may be perceived by disinterested parties as a conflict. If no potential conflicts of interests are identified, please state so.
- System for Award Management. Consultant/Firm is not debarred or suspended from the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS) in the System for Award Management (SAM). Include verification that your company as well as the company's principal is not listed (is not debarred) through the System for Award Management (www.SAM.gov). Enclose a print out of the search results that includes the record date.
- Form CIQ, (enclosed). Texas Local Government Code chapter 176 requires that any vendor or person who enters or seeks to enter into a contract with a local government entity disclose in the Questionnaire Form CIQ the vendor or person's employment, affiliation, business relationship, family relationship or provision of gifts that might cause a conflict of interest with a local government entity. 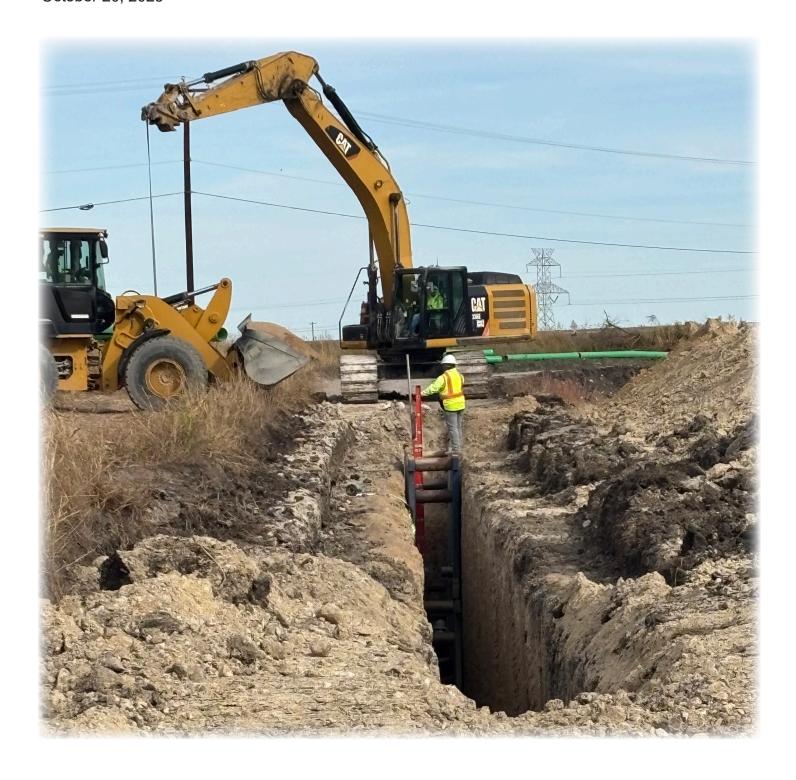

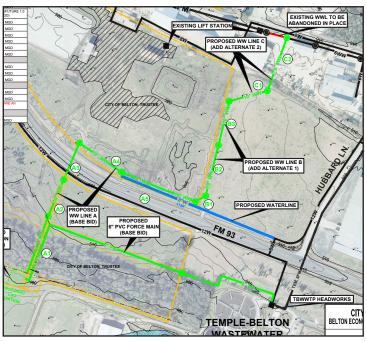

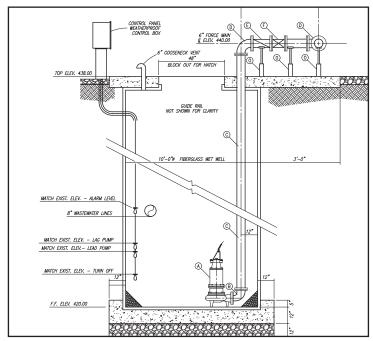

Description: The Rockwool Site Water and Wastewater Improvements project extends utility infrastructure to serve new industrial development within the former Rockwool Industries site in south Belton. The project includes construction of approximately 3,200 linear feet of 10-inch gravity wastewater main, 70 linear feet of 8-inch wastewater main, 1,590 linear feet of 6-inch force main, 1,370 linear feet of 8-inch waterline, and a duplex submersible lift station with yard piping, valves, fencing, electrical, instrumentation, and site grading improvements. The work also includes abandonment of the existing Taylors Valley Road lift station and elimination of the associated 2-inch force main.

Funded through a \$2.0 million Economic Development Administration (EDA) Economic Adjustment Assistance grant with a \$500,000 local match, the project enhances the City's capacity to attract and support jobcreating industrial growth within a designated redevelopment area. KPA served as the prime design engineer, responsible for project design, permitting, and construction-phase services, ensuring compliance with EDA funding and TCEQ regulatory standards.

Description: The City of Rockdale Generator Project utilized funds from the **Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program** to furnish and install emergency generators at their Water Treatment Facilities and Water Wells throughout their City. KPA and its electrical subconsultant analyzed the requirements for Generators at the City's Mill Street WTP, Texas WTP and Wells 7, 8, 9 & 10. The electrical analysis, along with the City's budget led to the following recommendations: 1) 175 kW/220 KVA Fixed Generator at Mill Street WTP, 2) 450 kW/563 KVA Fixed Generator at Texas WTP (to supply both Texas WTP & Well 10) and 3) 150 kW/188 KVA Mobil Generator that can be utilized at either Well 7, 8 or

9, including the applicable connections and infrastructure to allow integration of the generators. KPA coordinated with the City and the City's Grant Administrator to prepare the necessary submittal documents in order to be awarded the funding. We are currently 90% complete with the final design and anticipate the \$1.1 million project to bid prior to the end of 2025.

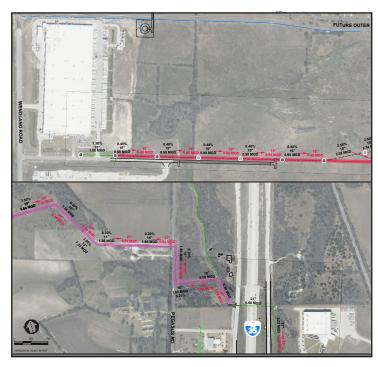

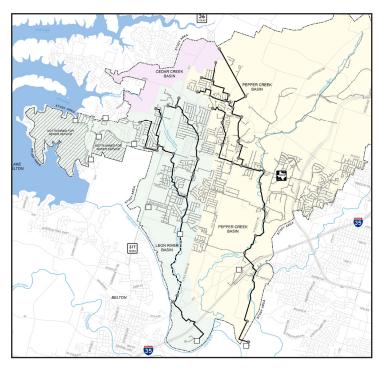

Improvements included replacement of existing pipelines with larger-diameter PVC wastewater lines, manhole rehabilitation, and site restoration. KPA provided design and construction phase services, coordinating with the City's Engineering Department and local developers to maintain service continuity and minimize construction impacts. The upgraded system improved hydraulic performance and prepared the network for future growth.

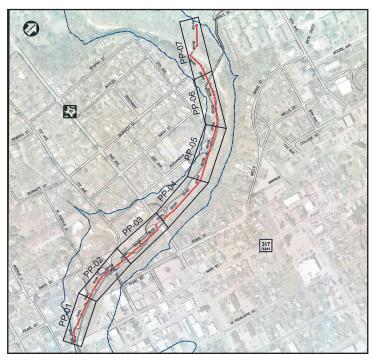
Description: TCEQ requires the existing wastewater collection systems over the Edwards Aguifer to be tested and rehabbed every year with the entire system being observed over a five year periord (1/5 of the system a year). KPA has been completing the EARZ Analysis and preparation of Rehabilitation Plans for the City of Georgetown annually since 2003. The Analysis consists of the review of field reports including photos and videos of the existing wastewater infrastructure (manholes and gravity sewer lines). Defects that could result in exfiltration are identified and methods of rehabilitation and/or replacement are recommended based on site specific observations. A preliminary report identifying the defects, rehabilitation method and opinion of probable cost are prepared. The rehabilitation methods utilized in the past consist of: Manholes -- replacement by open cut, interior rehabilitation and coating,

rehabilitation by cured in place method. Gravity Sewer Lines: replacement by open cut, replacement by realigning and abandoning, cured in place pipe (insitu) and pipe bursting (insitu). To date, we have completed 19 construction projects totaling over \$21.7 Million in construction.

Description: Due to significant growth and development in the Nolan Creek Basin, portions of the trunk sewer were at capacity and a preliminary design report was initiated to determine the existing flows and ultimate capacity required for the basin. In 2012, the existing 10" Trunk Sewer, from Water Street to the north, was determined to be at capacity and experiencing significant infiltration/inflow during rain events. Generally, this project included evaluation of the Nolan Creek Trunk Sewer, beginning at the BRA Lift Station, to determine the current capacity and condition of the wastewater line. RJN Group provided flow monitoring and manhole inspection services, which included 10 flow meters and 4 rain gauges monitored for 90 days. This provided the data necessary to determine the current base flow in the wastewater line and the magnitude of inflow/infiltration. As part of the Preliminary Design, the recommended

ultimate capacity to accommodate the growth in the area was determined. The report also included preliminary alignment of Phase I Improvements, opinions of probable cost, a phasing plan and project schedule for the replacement of the Nolan Creek Trunk Sewer. KPA completed Final Design of Phase I in 2015, which included approximately 4,000 ft of 24" Wastewater Line. The project was constructed by Bell Contractors, Inc. of Belton and was completed in Summer of 2016.

Description: In May 2015, the Village of Salado passed a Bond Election and received funding from an Economic Development Administration grant for construction of a wastewater collection system and treatment facility. At that time, the Village did not employ a city-wide sewer collection system and the majority of the businesses and residences were served by Onsite Sewage Facilities. The dependence on septic systems greatly limited the type of new residential developments, businesses and expansion of existing facilities in the downtown area.

In late 2015, KPA contracted with the Village of Salado to provide engineering design and construction administration services for a collection system to serve the Main Street, Church Street, Royal Street, West Village and Thomas Arnold Corridors. This system consisted of the installation of 2 Duplex Submersible

Pump Lift Stations, approximately 400 linear feet of 15" Wastewater Line, 3,800 linear feet of 12" wastewater line, 5,300 linear feet of 10" wastewater line, 6,200 linear feet of 8" wastewater line, 63 wastewater manholes, 2,500 linear feet of 8" force main, 8,200 linear feet of 6" force main, 4,000 linear feet of 2" and 3" low pressure force mains to serve areas not available for gravity infrastructure. KPA completed surveys, design and provided assistance in acquisition of 7 permanent utility easements and 0.28 acres along Church Street for a Lift Station site. KPA also coordinated with ONCOR Electric to provide power to the two lift stations and TxDOT Waco Division for approval to construct sewer facilities within their Right-of-Way. A collection system was designed for future expansion up to a peak flow of 2.22 MGD provided by final buildout of service areas.

Additionally, Lift Stations included variable frequency drives to accommodate initial low flow conditions when transferring existing services and new developments along the corridors served by the system. Bidding of the project was delayed until November 2017 due to sensitive environmental clearances required from the US Army Corp of Engineers and US Fish and Wildlife related to the threatened species (Salamander) in Salado Creek. KPA assisted the Village with Section 7 Consultation and coordinated with multiple federal entities to acquire the clearances needed to begin construction. Section 7 Consultation concluded in mid 2017 with the issuance of a Biological Opinion evaluation for the Salado Salamander. The total construction cost for the improvements was \$3,659,520. The WWTP Project (pictured) was completed in 2019 at a cost of \$4.9 Million

ABILITY TO CARRY OUT SCOPE



APPROACH TO REQUESTED SERVICES

KPA approaches every water and wastewater improvement project with a deliberate, methodical process designed to ensure technical accuracy, regulatory compliance, and efficient project delivery. Our design philosophy centers on proactive coordination, constructability, and cost awareness—factors that are critical to maintaining schedule and budget for publicly funded infrastructure projects.

Preliminary Design Phase

The Preliminary Design phase establishes the foundation for the entire project. KPA begins by compiling and reviewing all available data related to existing water and wastewater infrastructure, including record drawings, GIS files, and as-built documentation. We delineate easements and rights-of-way, identify existing utilities and crossings, and perform topographic surveys to capture surface features, manholes, valves, and drainage structures. Early coordination with environmental specialists ensures that site conditions and permitting requirements are clearly defined from the outset.

Using this data, our engineers develop design alternatives and conduct hydraulic modeling to evaluate system capacity, constructability, and lifecycle cost. Each alternative is reviewed collaboratively with City staff to confirm priorities such as alignment, service continuity, and long-term maintenance access. Deliverables at this phase typically include:

- A 30% preliminary design plan set showing proposed alignments and key features.
- An engineering memorandum summarizing hydraulic analysis, regulatory considerations, and basis of design decisions.
- An opinion of probable construction cost (OPCC) developed from recent bid data and local construction trends. A draft implementation schedule outlining anticipated design, bidding, and construction milestones.

This stage provides the City with a clear technical and financial roadmap before advancing into final design.

Final Design Phase

The Final Design phase transforms the selected alternative into detailed, biddable construction documents. This phase incorporates input from City staff, regulatory agencies, and utility stakeholders to finalize the project's technical and permitting components. KPA's team prepares comprehensive plan sheets and specifications that meet all applicable standards and funding program requirements. Typical plan components include detailed layouts of water and wastewater systems, pump station or lift station design (if applicable), erosion and sediment control, and restoration details. Our specifications outline material standards, testing procedures, and construction methods to ensure a complete and coordinated bid package.

Throughout design development, KPA manages structured submittals at the 30%, 60%, 95%, and 100% stages. Each submittal includes an updated cost estimate, project schedule, and response to prior review comments. These checkpoints maintain transparency, support informed decision-making, and ensure that the project remains aligned with available funding.

During this phase, KPA coordinates all required permits and clearances, including TCEQ wastewater collection and reuse approvals, EDA and EPA Site Certificate Approvals, TxDOT utility crossing permits, environmental documentation, and other agency reviews as applicable. Our design process emphasizes constructability—ensuring the plans are practical to build, minimize conflicts, and optimize long-term system performance.

Project Communication

Consistent and clear communication with The City will be a top priority throughout the project. We begin each engagement with a kick-off meeting to confirm scope, expectations, and communication preferences. At every design milestone (30%, 60%, 95%, 100%), we will schedule formal review meetings to walk through plan sets, receive input, and confirm alignment. Between these checkpoints, KPA's project manager will maintain frequent contact with CLSUD staff through scheduled progress calls and email updates. Minor coordination issues will be addressed promptly via phone or email.

We understand that proactive communication helps avoid delays, ensures early identification of concerns, and builds trust throughout the life of the project. Our team is committed to responsiveness and clarity in every interaction. Quality is a process by which clearly defined procedures are followed to ensure engineering products and services meet the declared measurable objectives. As part of KPA's Quality Assurance/Quality Control plan, we have developed a systematic process that assures that products and services are prepared to the standards of quality set forth.

Control of Quality

Q/A consists of design, plan, and report reviews before project milestones (i.e., preliminary engineering, 30%, 60%, 95%, and 100% plan and specification submittals). Q/A reviews on our work and our sub-consultants are performed by a project principal, the project manager, and individuals not associated with the project design as a third-party quality check. Client milestone reviews are an equally critical component of the Q/A process, as well as a valuable opportunity to obtain formal input on the City's preferences and participation in the design process. Q/C is a continuous process adhered to throughout design and product preparation that maximizes the overall quality of the product. Two essential elements for Q/C are Understanding and Review:

<u>Understanding</u>: For every task performed by an individual (i.e., designer, engineer, reviewer), the reasoning and logic (technical and non-technical) related to the job are understood by the individual performing the task. No guesswork is involved. The individual will not be asked to complete the task until the reasoning and logic are understood.

<u>Review</u>: Multiple individuals (i.e., designer, engineer, manager, reviewer) engage in completing each task. Control of construction costs, prevention of cost escalations, and overruns begin with preparing well-crafted construction plans, technical specifications, and contract documents that are detailed, unambiguous, and internally consistent, as the outcome of an effective QA/QC process during the design phase of the project.

Project Management, Schedule, and Budget Control

KPA's structure, staffing, and internal project management systems allow us to deliver projects efficiently and on schedule. Our multidisciplinary team provides the capacity to support concurrent workloads while maintaining the responsiveness required for active coordination with client staff. Each project is tracked through internal scheduling softwarethatassignsmilestones, reviewdates, and progress checkpoints to ensure deliverables are submitted on time.

We work collaboratively with our clients to align project scope with available budgets from the earliest stages of design. Cost awareness is integrated throughout our process—preliminary cost opinions are refined at each milestone to reflect current market conditions, contractor feedback, and historical bid data. This proactive approach enables informed decision-making, minimizes change orders, and supports adherence to budget.

KPA has an established record of completing public infrastructure projects within schedule and budget parameters. 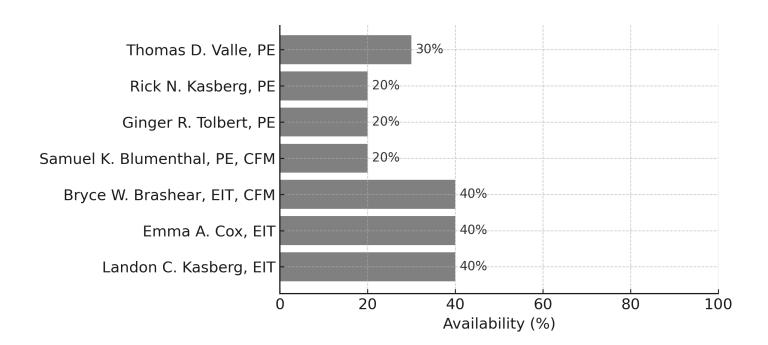


Team Capacity and Resource Allocation

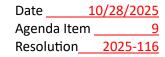

Information:

At the City Manager's request, the City's contract engineering firm, Freese & Nichols, provided a quote to assess the current condition of the City Auditorium. Concerns about the building include:

- Structural no known assessment of the auditorium/stage area, nor the former city hall area, since the 1938 construction.
- Electrical outdated control panels, wiring, circuit breakers, and multiple sources into building.
- Hazardous materials asbestos, mold, or other.
- Future renovation the initial assessment will guide the scope and necessity of any future renovation projects for the stage/auditorium area, former city hall area, and current city council chambers.

FNI will conduct field investigations and document building deficiencies relative to compliance with current code, life safety, accessibility, and energy efficiency regulations. Documentation will include systems and equipment noting those items which may be at, near or past the end of their useful life cycle. They will then submit a final report to the City, upon which we will base the necessary decisions for the building.

This proposed expenditure has been reviewed by City Attorney Thomas and qualifies for HOT funds in the following manner:

- Part 1:
 - Events do bring out of town guests currently, estimated to be 50-100 per year.
 - Renovation of the auditorium would bring many more visitors from out of town.
- Part 2:
 - The auditorium is historic, built in 1938, and would be renovated to match its historic appearance.
 - o The auditorium promotes the arts currently, with monthly music and dance events.
 - The auditorium would promote many more arts events, including theatrical performances, once renovated.

Financial Impact: Up to \$45,650 in HOT Funds; current balance of HOT Fund is \$928,646.

Freese and Nichols, Inc. (FNI) is pleased to submit this proposal for providing professional architectural and engineering services to the City of Gatesville (City) for the evaluation/assessment of the Auditorium Building at 110 North 8th Street. This proposal is based on a request to re-engage on a previous proposal (submitted in 2023) on September 29, 2025. Conor Mitchell, P.E. will serve as project manager.

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

Based on our earlier conversation, it is our understanding that the Auditorium Building in Gatesville was constructed in the 1930s. The two-story building houses not only an auditorium but also the City Council chambers, office and storage space. The City is planning to make significant renovations to the building but is aware of its multiple deficiencies. The City has requested that FNI perform an evaluation of the building and its systems to provide a more accurate scope prior to engaging an AE firm for design services.

The assessment will be conducted by a multi-discipline team of FNI architects, structural and mechanical-electrical-plumbing engineers, and specialty subconsultants. The assessment will conclude with a written report describing the property's conditions and identified deficiencies.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

FNI will provide the following services:

- 1. Provide overall project management and reporting.
- 2. Receive and review all pertinent project data from City. This will include, but not be limited to, all existing building construction documents, site surveys, reports, and previous facility analyses.
- Conduct kick-off meeting and field investigation of the building by architects and engineers. Meet
 with City staff to identify known issues and maintenance items. Investigations will be visual and
 include building systems and the building envelope. Photographs will document the
 investigations.
- 4. Provide a hazardous material survey of the main building. This will be performed by FNI subconsultant Industrial Hygiene and Safety Technology (IHST).

- 5. Following the field investigations document building deficiencies relative to compliance with current code, life safety, accessibility, and energy efficiency regulations. Documentation will include systems and equipment noting those items which may be at, near or past the end of their useful life cycle.
- 6. Prepare a draft report summarizing the tasks above. Distribute the draft report to City for review and comment.
- 7. Conduct a virtual meeting between City and FNI to discuss City's review comments.
- 8. Address City's comments and make revisions to the report.
- 9. Prepare the final report and transmit to City.

ASSUMPTIONS/CLARIFICATIONS

- 1. Report will address deficiencies only, no recommendations for repairs are included.
- 2. Report will not include Opinion of Probable Construction Costs for resolving/repairing deficiencies.
- 3. It is assumed that the building is not in an historic district or listed with the Texas Historical Commission.
- 4. Hazardous Material testing will be performed by Industrial Hygiene and Safety Testing (IHST). Their survey will include sampling for mold, asbestos and lead paint, testing of those samples and a written report on their findings.
- 5. The structural assessment proposed is based on visual observations only and does not include quantitative structural analysis. If structural analysis or more extensive structural investigation is required, that effort is not included in the current scope of work and will be included as a recommendation in the report.

SCHEDULE

FNI will provide services in accordance with the attached schedule. If FNI's services are delayed through no fault of FNI, FNI shall be entitled to equitable adjustment of the contract schedule consistent with the number of days of delay.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF CITY

City shall perform the following in a timely manner so as not to delay the services of FNI:

- 1. Designate in writing a person to act as City's representative with respect to the services to be rendered under this Agreement. Such person shall have contract authority to transmit instructions, receive information, interpret and define City's policies and decisions with respect to FNI's services for the Project.
- 2. Provide all criteria and full information as to City's requirements for the Project, including design objectives and constraints, space, capacity and performance requirements, flexibility and expandability, and any budgetary limitations; and furnish copies of all design and construction standards which City will require to be included in the plans and specifications.

City shall also make or arrange to have made the interpretations of data and reports resulting from such investigations. All costs associated with such investigations shall be paid by City.
- 7. Provide such accounting, independent cost estimating and insurance counseling services as may be required for the Project, such legal services as City may require or FNI may reasonably request with regard to legal issues pertaining to the Project.

DELIVERABLES

All deliverables to City shall be in electronic pdf format including draft and final reports.

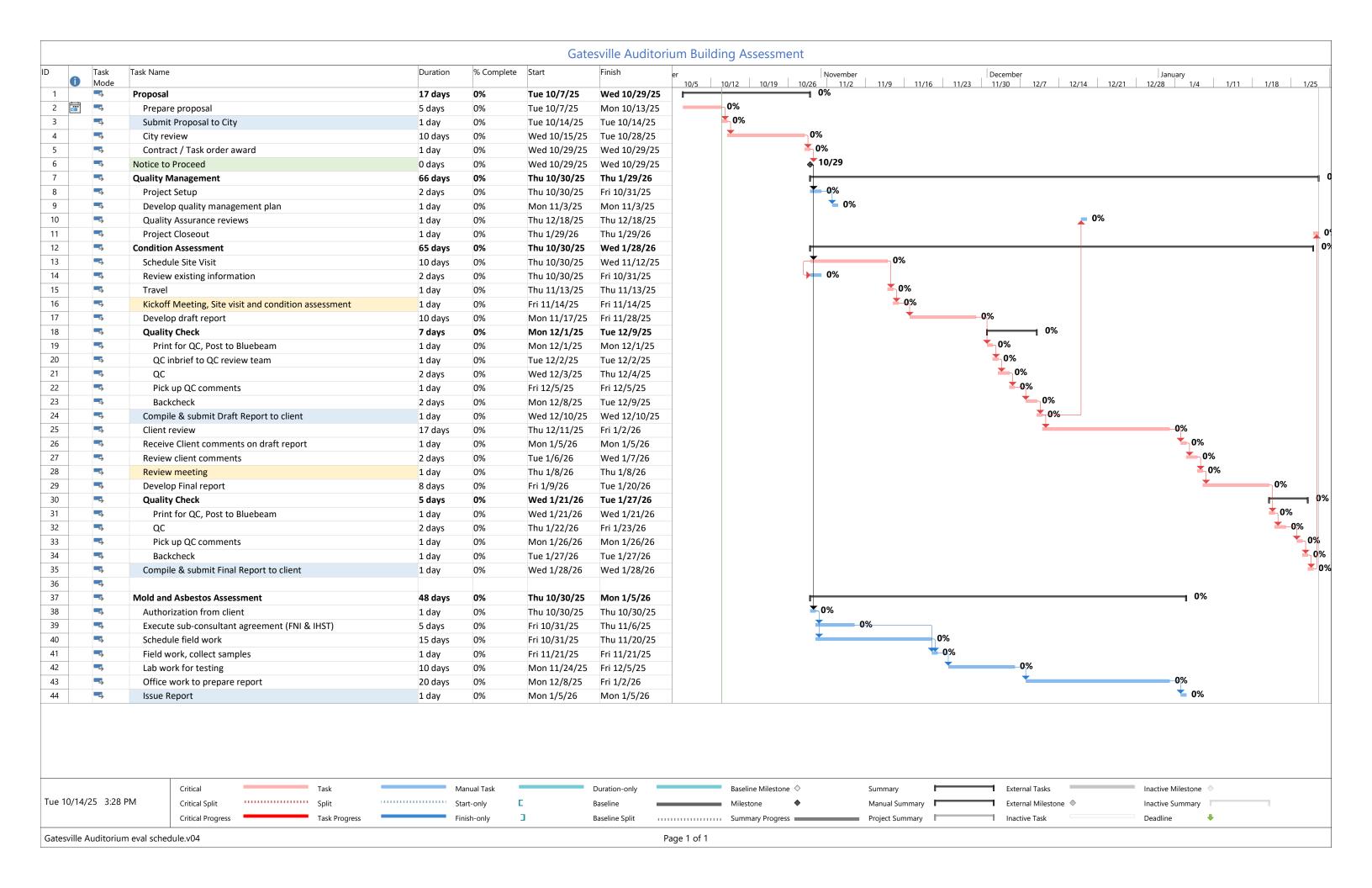

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF AGREEMENT

- 1. **DEFINITIONS:** As used herein: (1) City refers to the party named as such in the Agreement between the City and FNI; (2) FNI refers to Freese and Nichols, Inc., its employees and agents, and its subcontractors and their employees and agents; and (3) Services refers to the professional services performed by FNI pursuant to the Agreement.
- 2. **INFORMATION FURNISHED BY CITY:** City will assist FNI by placing at FNI's disposal all available information pertinent to the project, including previous reports and any other data relative to design or construction of the project. FNI shall have no liability for defects or negligence in the Services attributable to FNI's reliance upon or use of data, design criteria, drawings, specifications, or other information furnished by City. To the fullest extent permitted by law, City agrees to indemnify and hold FNI harmless from any and all claims and judgments, and all losses, costs, and expenses arising therefrom. FNI shall disclose to City, prior to use thereof, defects or omissions in the data, design criteria, drawings, specifications, or other information furnished by City to FNI that FNI may reasonably discover in its review and inspection thereof.
- 3. STANDARD OF CARE: FNI will perform all professional services under this Agreement with the professional skill and care ordinarily provided by competent members of the subject profession practicing under the same or similar circumstances and professional license as expeditiously as is prudent considering the ordinary professional skill and care of a competent member of the subject profession. CHANGES: City, without invalidating the Agreement, may order changes within the general scope of Services required by the Agreement by altering, adding, and/or deducting from the Services to be performed. If any such change under this clause causes an increase or decrease in FNI's cost or time required for the performance of any part of the Services, an equitable adjustment will be made by mutual agreement and the Agreement will be modified in writing accordingly.
 - FNI will make changes to the drawings, specifications, reports, documents, or other deliverables as requested by City. However, when such changes differ from prior comments, directions, instructions, or approvals given by City or are due to causes not solely within the control of FNI, FNI shall be entitled to additional compensation and time required for performance of such changes to the Services authorized under this Agreement.
- 6. OPINION OF PROBABLE CONSTRUCTION COSTS: No fixed limit of project construction cost shall be established as a condition of the Agreement, unless agreed upon in writing and signed by the parties hereto. If a fixed limit is established, FNI shall be permitted to include contingencies for design, bidding, and price escalation in the construction contract documents to make reasonable adjustments in the scope of the project to adjust the project construction cost to the fixed limit. Such contingencies may include bid allowances, alternate bids, or other methods that allow FNI to

determine what materials, equipment, component systems, and types of construction are to be included in the construction contract documents. Fixed limits, if any, shall be increased by the same amount as any increase in the contract price after execution of the construction contract.

FNI will furnish an opinion of probable construction or program cost based on present day pricing, but does not guarantee the accuracy of such estimates. Opinions of probable cost, financial evaluations, feasibility studies, economic analyses of alternate solutions, and utilitarian considerations of operations and maintenance costs prepared by FNI hereunder will be made on the basis of FNI's experience and qualifications and represent FNI's judgment as an experienced and qualified design professional. Accordingly, FNI cannot and does not warrant or represent that bids or cost proposals will not vary from the City's project budget or from any estimate or opinion of probable construction or program cost prepared by or agreed to by FNI.

7. PAYMENT: Progress payments may be requested by FNI based on the amount of Services completed. Payment for Services shall be due and payable upon submission of a statement for Services to City and in acceptance of Services as satisfactory by City. Statements for Services shall not be submitted more frequently than monthly. Any applicable taxes imposed upon the Services, expenses, and charges by any governmental body after the execution of this Agreement will be added to FNI's compensation.

If City fails to make any payment due FNI for Services, expenses, and charges within 30 days after receipt of FNI's statement for Services therefore, the amounts due FNI will be increased at the rate of 1 percent per month from said 30th day, and, in addition, FNI may, after giving 7 days' written notice to City, suspend Services under this Agreement until FNI has been paid in full for all amounts due for Services, expenses, and charges.

If FNI's Services are delayed or suspended by City or are extended for more than 60 days through no fault of FNI, FNI shall be entitled to equitable adjustment of rates and amounts of compensation to reflect reasonable costs incurred by FNI in connection with such delay or suspension and reactivation and the fact that the time for performance under this Agreement has been revised.

8. **OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS:** All drawings, reports, data, and other project information developed in the execution of Services provided under this Agreement shall be the property of City upon payment of FNI's fees for Services. FNI may retain copies for record purposes. City agrees such documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for reuse by City or others. Any reuse by City or by those who obtained said documents from City without written verification or adaptation by FNI, will be at the City's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to FNI, or to FNI's independent associates or consultants. To the fullest extent permitted by law, City shall indemnify and hold harmless FNI and FNI's independent associates and consultants from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting therefrom. Any such verification or adaptation will entitle FNI to further reasonable compensation. FNI may reuse all drawings, report data, and other project information in the execution of Services provided under this Agreement in FNI's other activities. Any reuse by FNI will be at FNI's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to City, and FNI shall indemnify and hold harmless City from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses including reasonable attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting therefrom.

- 9. **TERMINATION:** The obligation to provide Services under this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon 10 days' written notice. In the event of termination, FNI will be paid for all Services rendered and reimbursable expenses incurred to the date of termination and, in addition, all reimbursable expenses directly attributable to termination.
- 10. **CONSTRUCTION REPRESENTATION:** If required by the Agreement, FNI will furnish construction representation according to the defined scope for these Services. FNI will observe the progress and the quality of work to determine in general if the work is proceeding in accordance with the construction contract documents. In performing these Services, FNI will report any observed deficiencies to City, however, it is understood that FNI does not guarantee the contractor's performance, nor is FNI responsible for the supervision of the contractor's operation and employees. FNI shall not be responsible for the contractor's means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction or the safety precautions and programs incident to the work of the contractor. FNI shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any person (except its own employees or agents) at the project site or otherwise performing any of the work of the project. If City designates a resident project representative that is not an employee or agent of FNI, the duties, responsibilities, and limitations of authority of such resident project representative will be set forth in writing and made a part of this Agreement before the construction phase of the project begins.
- 11. **GENERAL CONDITIONS OF THE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT:** City agrees to include provisions in the general conditions of the construction contract that name FNI: (1) as an additional insured and in any waiver of subrogation rights with respect to such liability insurance purchased and maintained by the contractor for the project (except workers' compensation and professional liability policies); and (2) as an indemnified party in any indemnification provisions where City is named as an indemnified party.
- 12. **POLLUTANTS AND HAZARDOUS WASTES:** It is understood and agreed that FNI has neither created nor contributed to the creation or existence of any hazardous, radioactive, toxic, irritant, pollutant, or otherwise dangerous substance or condition at the project site, if any, and its compensation hereunder is in no way commensurate with the potential risk of injury or loss that may be caused by exposures to such substances or conditions. The parties agree that in performing Services required by this Agreement, FNI does not take possession or control of the subject site, but acts as an invitee in performing Services, and is not therefore responsible for the existence of any pollutant present on or migrating from the site. Further, FNI shall have no responsibility for any pollutant during clean-up, transportation, storage or disposal activities.
- 13. **SUBCONTRACTS:** If, for any reason and at any time during the progress of providing Services, City determines that any subcontractor for FNI is incompetent or undesirable, City shall notify FNI accordingly and FNI shall take immediate steps for cancellation of such subcontract. Subletting by subcontractors shall be subject to the same regulations. Nothing contained in the Agreement shall create any contractual relation between any subcontractor and City.
- 14. **PURCHASE ORDERS:** If a purchase order is used to authorize FNI's Services, only the terms, conditions, and instructions typed on the face of the purchase order shall apply to this Agreement. Should there be any conflict between the purchase order and the terms of this Agreement, then this Agreement shall prevail and be determinative of the conflict.

- 15. **CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES:** In no event shall FNI be liable in contract, tort, strict liability, warranty, or otherwise for any special, indirect, incidental, or consequential damages (such as loss of product, loss of use of equipment or systems, loss of anticipated profits or revenue, non-operation or increased expense of operation), arising out of, resulting from, or in any way related to this Agreement or the project.
- 16. **ARBITRATION:** No arbitration, arising out of or relating to this Agreement, involving one party to this Agreement may include the other party to this Agreement without their approval.
- 17. **SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNMENTS:** City and FNI and the partners, successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives of each are hereby bound to the other party to this Agreement and to the partners, successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives (and said assigns) of such other party, in respect of all covenants, agreements, and obligations of this Agreement.

Neither City nor FNI shall assign, sublet, or transfer any rights under or interest in (including, but without limitation, moneys that may become due or moneys that are due) this Agreement without the written consent of the other, except to the extent that any assignment, subletting, or transfer is mandated by law or the effect of this limitation may be restricted by law. Unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under this Agreement. Nothing contained in this paragraph shall prevent FNI from employing such independent associates and consultants as FNI may deem appropriate to assist in the performance of Services hereunder.

Chapter 1: Introduction

1.1 Comprehensive Plan Overview

The City of Gatesville Comprehensive Plan was adopted in 2020 to establish a cohesive vision for the future growth and development of the community. It is intended to help guide the city's elected and appointed bodies, as well as city staff, property owners, businesses and developers as they prepare for the future. Furthermore, the purpose of the adoption of a comprehensive plan, as stated in the enabling statute (Texas LGC Chapter 213), is to promote sound development, and the health, safety, and welfare of the community. The adoption of a comprehensive plan helps a city to achieve these basic goals by enabling the enactment of zoning regulations (Texas LGC Chapter 211.004), providing strategic guidance on capital investments, and identifying potential transportation improvements. At its core, the plan serves as an expression of a set of basic community ideals that form the basis for ongoing growth and prosperity.

To ensure the Plan remains relevant to current City goals, it is being updated in 2025 by City of Gatesville Staff and Council. The Comprehensive Plan will then be fully re-written in 2030, via process similar in depth as the 2020 Plan.

Prior to 2020, the last time that he City of Gatesville undertook a comprehensive planning process was in 1970 when the city received a HUD grant to develop and adopt a plan in preparation for initially enacting zoning regulations in the city. With a horizon year of 1990, the plan became disused over time as it stopped reflecting the conditions and challenges found in the community as it grew and changed over time (for example: the establishment of the six-unit TDCJ facility in Gatesville beginning in the early 1980s).

Recognizing the need to update the plan to reflect the changes that had taken place in the city over the 45+ years since its adoption, the city embarked on this planning process in mid-2017. Partial funding for the plan was provided by the Office of Economic Adjustment (an agency of the Department of Defense), whose interest in Gatesville's future growth and development is tied to neighboring Fort Hood. As an implementation effort spurred by the Fort Hood Joint Land Use Study (which Gatesville participated in), the plan has some additional focus on Fort Hood, its role in the community, and compatible growth guidance related to military training impacts associated with the installation.

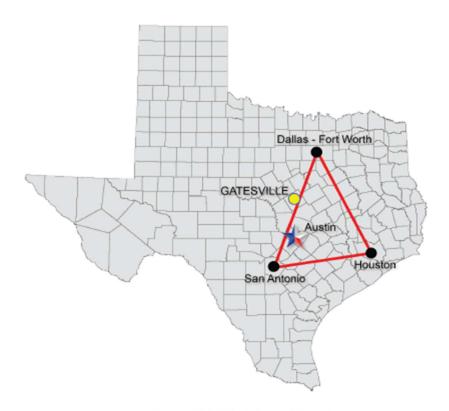
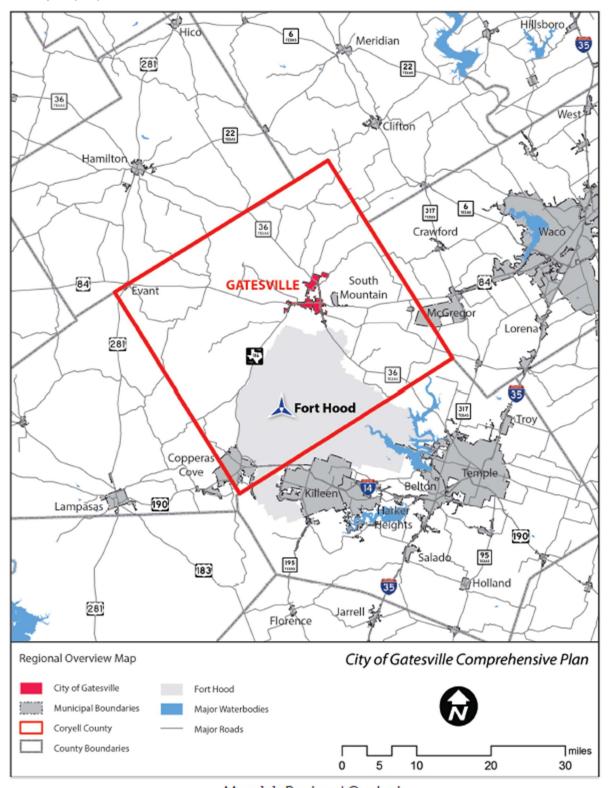


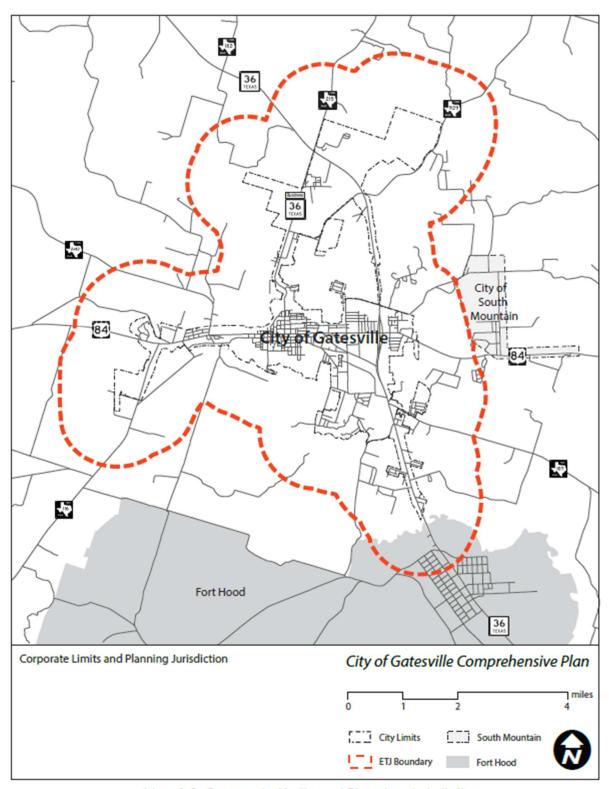
Figure 1.1: The Texas Triangle

Although growth in Gatesville had slowed somewhat between about 2015 to 2024, the city's proximity to Fort Hood, major transportation corridors, and the booming growth of the Texas Triangle (see Figure 1.1), make it a likely candidate to see new development pressure emerge as businesses, workers and developers seek more affordable options to the 1-35 corridor and cities such as Waco and Temple (see Map I, I). In the short timeframe of May 2024 to August 2025, over 36 new development projects were tracked by the City Manager and City Secretary, ranging from active construction to serious or repeat inquiries. This recent activity has proven the above theory relevant, and Gatesville now firmly stands on the precipice of a much stronger growth trend in the near term, and possibly beyond. With this impending growth pressure, there is a critical need for the city and its leaders to ensure that they are prepared with a vision and policies to aid decision-making that will help to preserve the desired aspects of the city's character, respond to changing conditions in a coordinated manner, and make wise investments with the limited resources available to the city.

1.2 Community Input

The input received through the process was used to help shape the city's vision and develop a set of guiding principles that will be used to help implement the plan following its adoption. The next surveys will be conducted in 2028-29, to be used in the complete re-write of this plan in 2030.

In total, almost 350 surveys were completed during the early phases of the planning process. In order to reach as broad of an audience as possible, the city made the survey available on its website, notified the Gatesville Messenger, distributed fliers in the city library, and reached out to large employers and community organizations. Once completed, the survey results were summarized to identify key trends and issues. The results were then presented back to the community, as well as to the City Council and Planning and Zoning Commission, to ensure that the results were consistent with their thoughts and to identify any anomalies that might warrant further investigation. The survey results and response summaries are included on the following pages.

Throughout the process, the City Manager and the planning consultant made several other presentations to the Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission during open meetings to keep them apprised of progress and get feedback on key points of the plan. As the draft plan was completed, the community was once again invited to provide input on the plan and again at the formal public hearing prior to the plan's adoption.

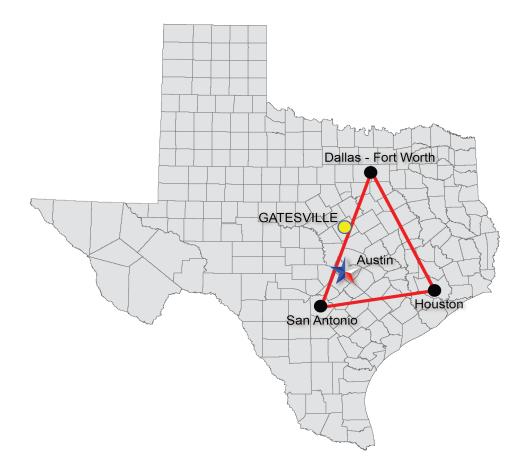
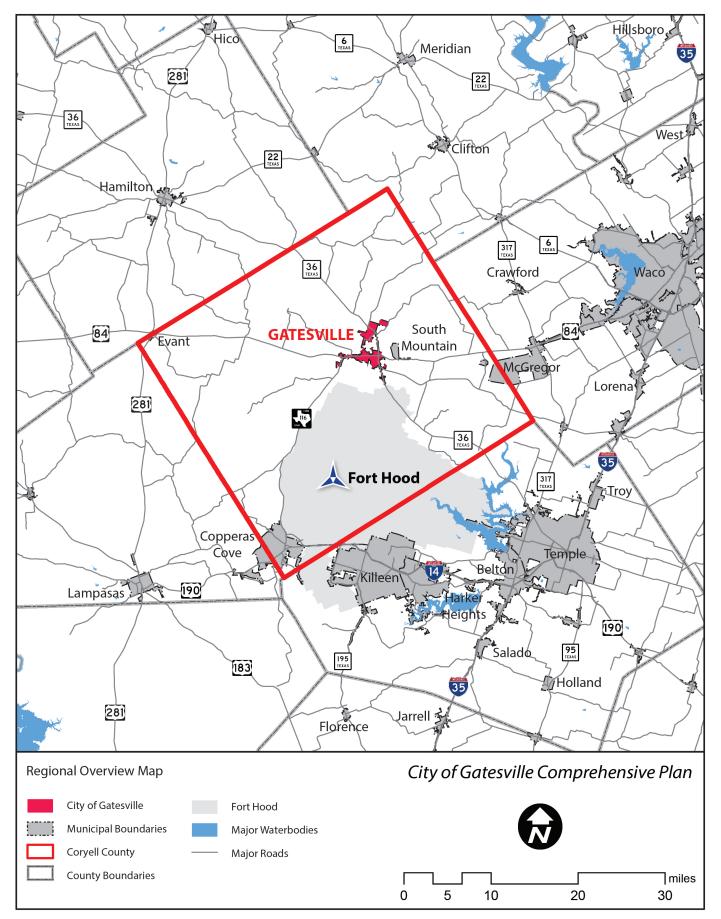


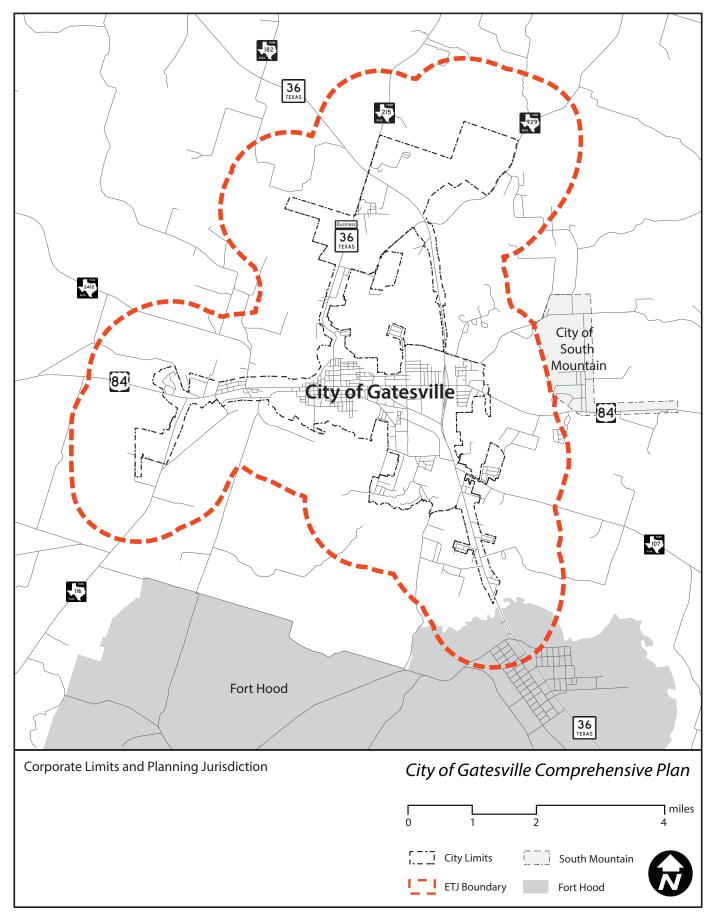
Figure 1.1: The Texas Triangle

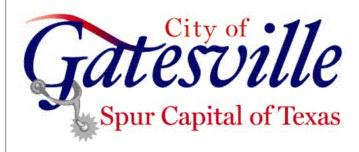

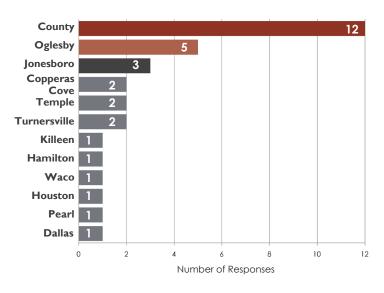

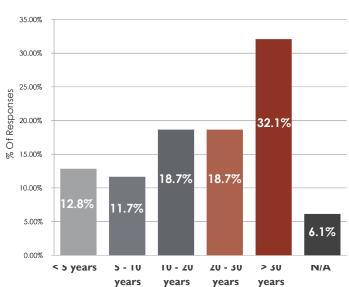

▼ FIGURE 1.4 NON-RESIDENTS



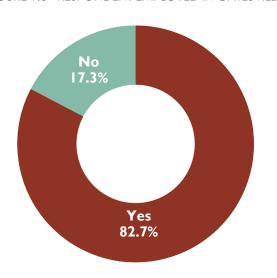
▼ FIGURE 1.5 LENGTH OF RESIDENCE



The vast majority of those who responded to the survey either live in Gatesville (86%) and/or work in Gatesville (64%). A significant number of the respondents reported that they have resided in the city for more than 30 years (32%) and another 37% reported living in the area for between 10 and 30 years. Fifty-eight percent (58%) of respondents own property in Gatesville as well. Thirty-eight respondents (11%) stated that they live outside of Gatesville in Coryell County, Jonesboro, Oglesby, Turnersville, Dallas, Pearl, Houston, Waco, Temple, Killeen, Hamilton, and Copperas Cove.

▼ FIGURE 1.6 RESPONDENT EMPLOYED IN GATESVILLE

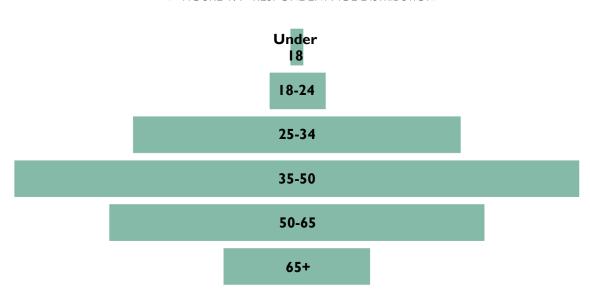

▼ FIGURE 1.4 RESPONDENT AGE DISTRIBUTION

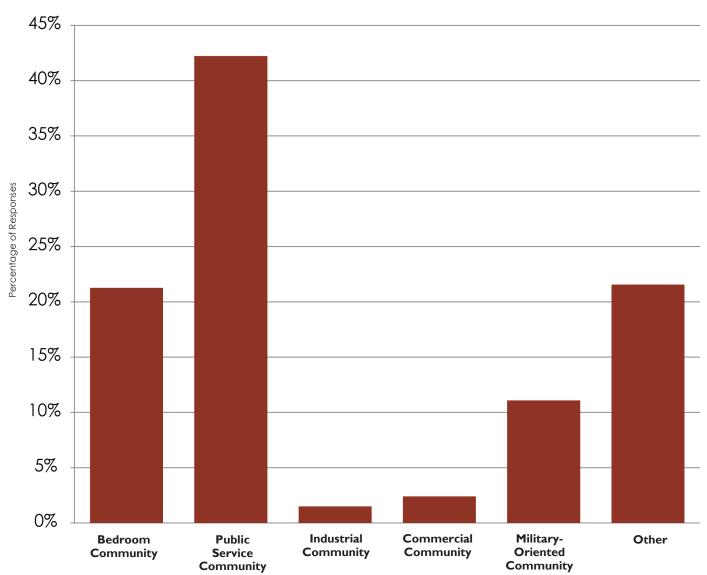


The largest share of respondents reported being between the ages of 35 and 50, with the overwhelming majority of respondents stating their age as between 25 and 65. Of the respondents who reported that they were currently employed, over 80% reported that their place of employment is within the City of Gatesville. Most of the respondents are employed in the government/public service sector (46%), with private business closely following (33%). Only one percent of respondents stated that they were unemployed, while just over 10% of the respondents reported that they were retired,

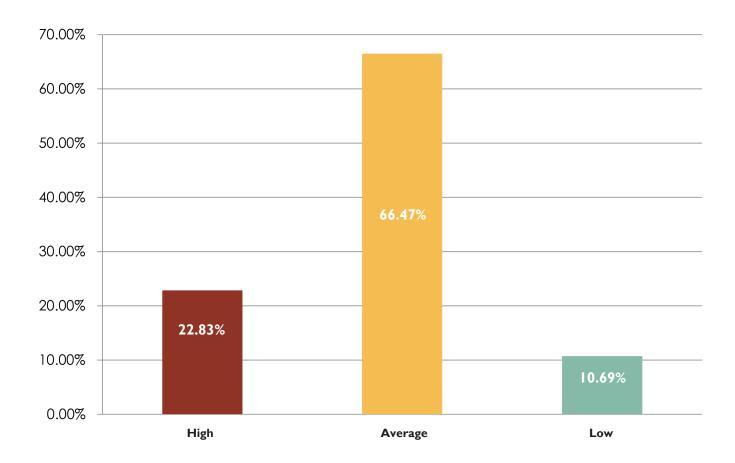
▼ FIGURE 1.7 COMMUNITY PERCEPTION



When asked about their perception of Gatesville, the majority of respondents stated that Gatesville is a public service-oriented community focused on government jobs and services (42%). The other significant responses include a "bedroom community" for workers with jobs in larger cities in the region, and a "military community" due to the proximity and longstanding ties to Fort Hood. Around 20% of respondents indicated "other" as their response and provided their own take on the nature of the city. These responses included descriptions of the city focused on its association with TDCJ facilities, as a retirement community, and as a small "hometown" type of community.

Question 2: How would you rank the quality of life that you experience living in Gatesville?

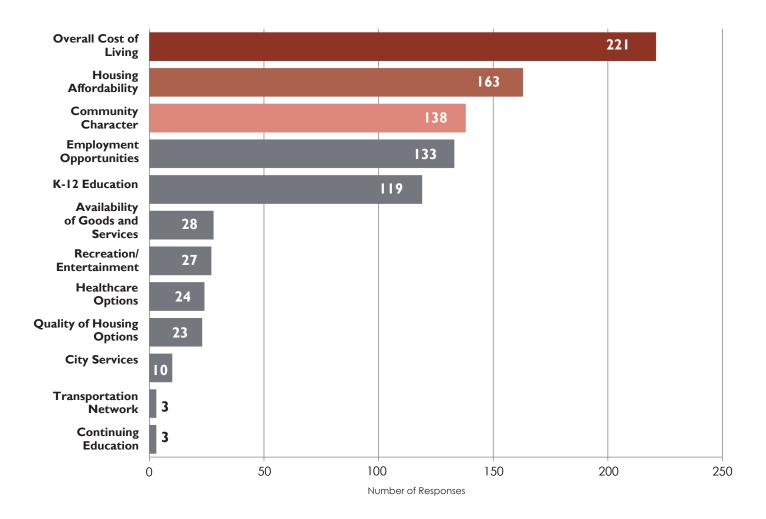
▼ FIGURE 1.8 QUALITY OF LIFE

Question 3: Of the following quality of life factors, which three were the most important to your decision to live in Gatesville?

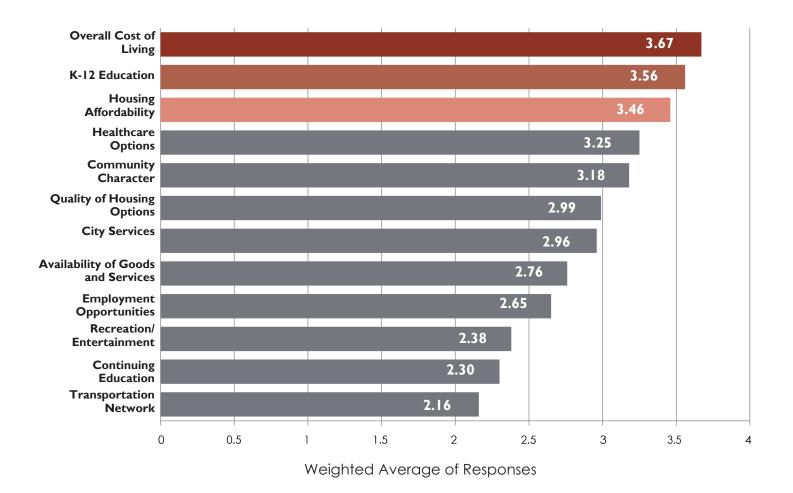
▼ FIGURE 1.9 DECISION TO LIVE IN GATESVILLE



When asked to indicate the top 3 quality of life factors that influenced their decision to live in Gatesville, the top five scoring responses were overall cost of living (63%), housing affordability (47%), community character/appearance (40%), employment opportunities (38%), and K-12 education opportunities (34%). The other listed choices each represented less than 10% of the responses. Notable among the low scoring factors were recreation / entertainment options, city services and the quality of housing.

Question 4: What is your perception of the following quality of life factors in Gatesville? (Rating on a scale from Poor(1) to Excellent (5))

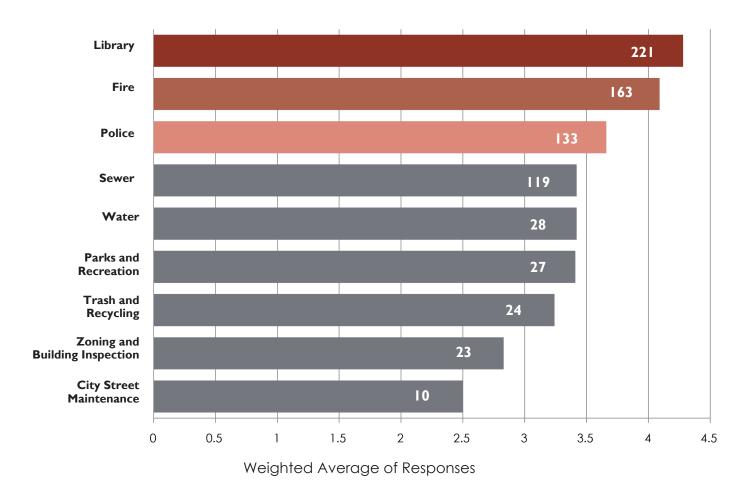
▼ FIGURE 1.10 QUALITY OF LIFE FACTORS



This question asked respondents to indicate their perception of a list of quality of life factors. They were asked to rate them with responses of poor, below average, adequate, good, or excellent. There was also an option for respondents to give an answer of "no opinion." The chart above shows the weighted average score associated with the responses for each of the factors, with scores closer to 1 indicating "poor" perception and scores closer to 5 indicating "excellent" perception of the quality of life factor. The most positively perceived factors included the cost of living, K-12 education and housing affordability, while recreation / entertainment, continuing education and transportation were the least positively perceived, receiving average scores that indicated a "below average perception of those factors.

Question 5 asked respondents to give their perception of the level and quality of services provided by the City of Gatesville. These were scored in the same manner as the previous question, with weighted responses closer to 1 indicating "poor" perception of the service and responses closer to 5 indicating "excellent" perception of the level or quality of each service. The responses to this question showed that the city's library and public safety services (fire and police) had the most positive perception of their quality, while street maintenance, zoning and building inspection services and trash and recycling services had the lowest perceived quality, as indicated by the responses to the question.

Question 6: What services (including expansion of existing services) should the city offer to residents and businesses that are not currently offered of available in Gatesville?

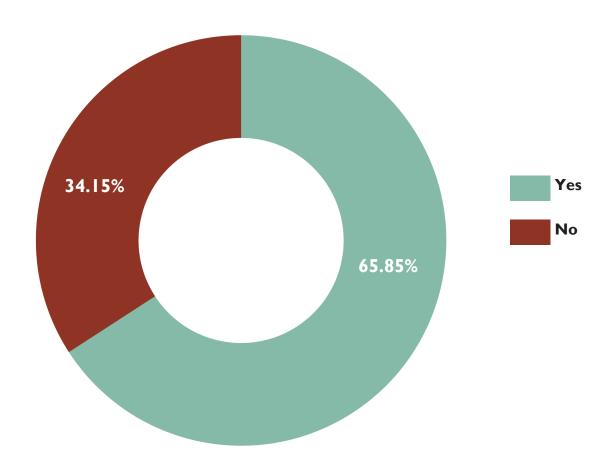
▼ FIGURE 1.12 DESIRED SERVICES



This question offered respondents the opportunity to provide their ideas and suggestions about the types of services the City should offer to residents and businesses that are not currently provided by the city. Among the top responses were recycling, which received 33 mentions, and the internet (specifically the need for higher speed service), which received 29 mentions.

Question 7: Would you support an increase in taxes of user fees to pay for adding new services or increasing the level of services that are currently provided?

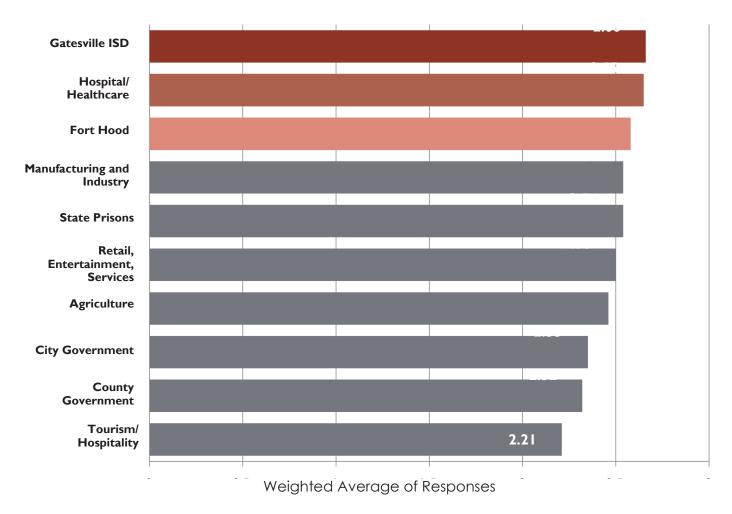
▼ FIGURE 1.13 SUPPORT FOR INCREASE IN TAXES FOR SERVICES

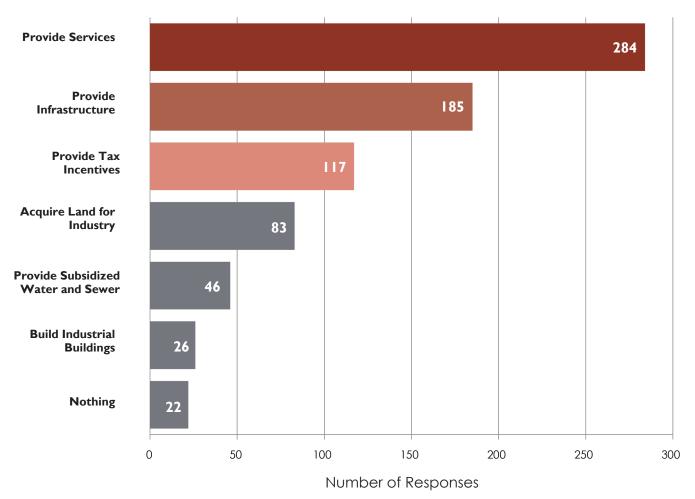
▼ FIGURE 1.14 IMPORTANCE OF BUSINESS AND EMPLOYMENT SECTORS



This survey question asked respondents about their perception of the importance of a variety of economic / employment sectors to the City's ongoing economic prosperity. Th These responses were weighted on a scale of 1 to 4, with the higher scores indicating a higher perception of the importance of the particular sector. The generally tight grouping of scores in response to this question indicates that no particular sector is perceived as having a significantly greater impact on the local economy by the public. The greatest divergence in the responses is in regard to the hospitality and tourism sector, which is generally perceived to be on the lower end of the scale of importance to the local economy.

Question 9: What should the City's role be in supporting economic development efforts to attract new employment opportunities to the city or help retain existing employers? (Select all that apply)

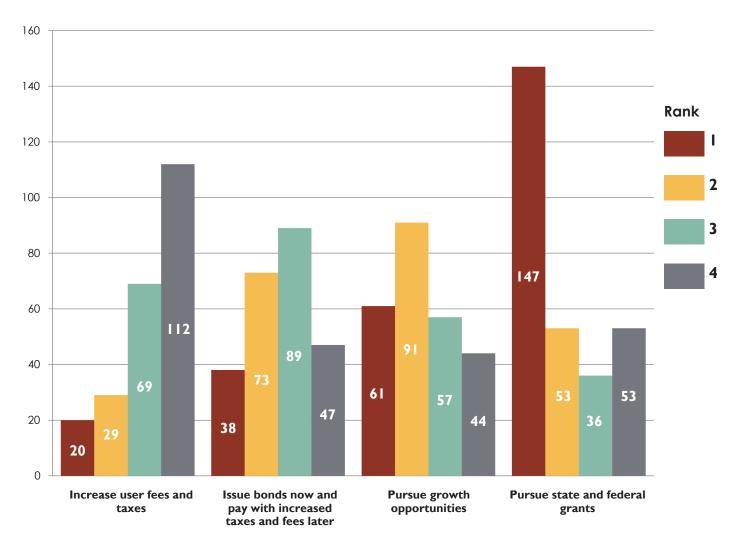




When asked to select from a range of options regarding the appropriate role for the City in supporting economic development efforts, respondents overwhelmingly selected the response of "provide services and make improvements to the city that promote a high quality of life for residents and make the city attractive to new businesses" (83%). This question allowed respondents to select multiple responses since the various policies and actions presented as choices are not exclusive of each other. The other response that received significant support (54%) encourages the City to undertake infrastructure improvements to spur economic development. This question also presented a choice of "do nothing" and this response received only 6% of the overall number of votes, which indicates underlying support in the community for the city to take positive actions in support of economic development efforts.

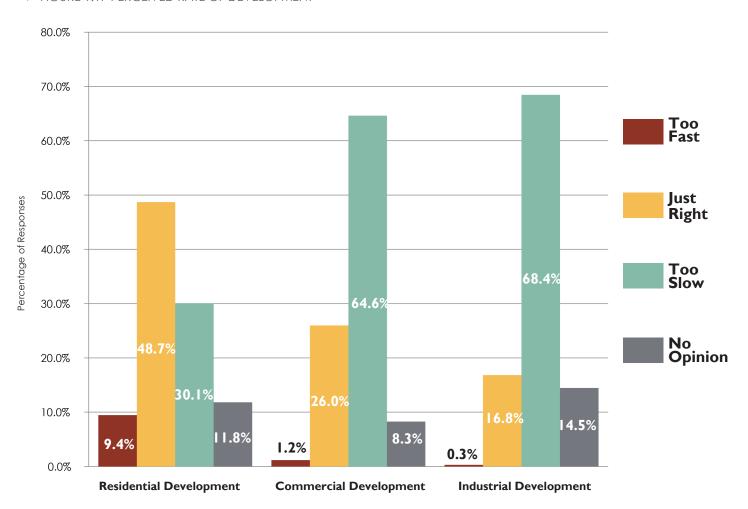
▼ FIGURE 1.16 METHODS TO IMPROVE CITY'S INFRASTRUCTURE



In regards to the improvement of the city's infrastructure, residents were asked to rank, from most desirable to least desirable, the options that the city could do to finance such improvements. The choice receiving the largest number of first choice rankings was for the city to pursue state and federal grants to fund infrastructure upgrades. The choice receiving the greatest number of fourth choice rankings was for the city to increase user fees and taxes to pay for improvements. It is important to note that 54 respondents skipped this question (15%).

Question 11: How would you characterize your perception of the pace of development in Gatesville in recent years with regard to the following?

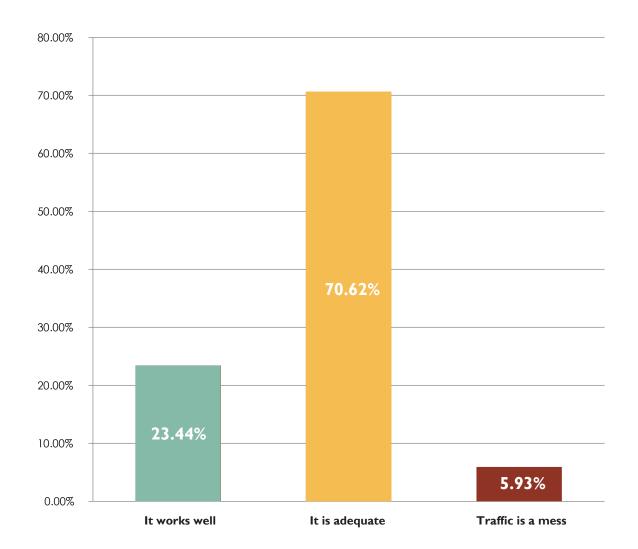
▼ FIGURE 1.17 PERCEIVED RATE OF DEVELOPMENT



Respondents were asked to rate how they felt about the pace of development in Gatesville in recent years. They were asked about residential, commercial and industrial development in terms of being too fast, just right, too slow, or no opinion. In general, respondents indicates that residential development in Gatesville was proceeding at a pace that they felt was "just right." Both commercial and industrial development, however were perceived as lagging behind, with nearly 2/3 of respondents indicating that the pace of both was "too slow."

Question 12: Which of the following best describes your perception of the city's vehicular transportation network?

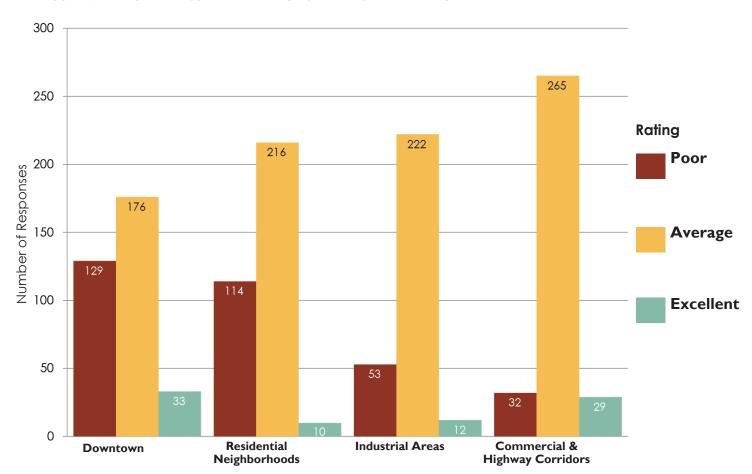
▼ FIGURE 1.18 PERCEPTION OF TRANSPORTATION NETWORK



When asked about their perception of the City's vehicular transportation network, respondents felt that "it is adequate for current traffic levels, but may need improvement if the city grows" (71%). This was followed by 24 percent stating that "it works very well – no problems getting around the city." From the standpoint of functionality, it appears that the city has the backbone of a network that serves residents and businesses well. This is in direct contrast to the perception of the maintenance of the network, which respondents indicated a negative view of in previous questions in the survey.

Question 13: What is your perception about the aesthetic (visual) appearance and quality of development in the following general areas of the city:

Residents were asked what their perception of the visual appearance and quality of development is for several generalized areas of the city. The most common response for each of the areas was "average." In contrast to the other two areas, downtown and residential neighborhoods both received significant numbers of responses of "poor" perception of the quality of those areas. Ratings of "excellent" were infrequently given for any of the areas, with "poor" ratings outnumbering "excellent" ratings for each area. Although somewhat tightly clustered below an average rating (with a 1 indicating "poor" and a 3 indicating excellent) the weighted average scores reveal that residential areas have the lowest perception of quality, while the commercial areas have the highest perception of quality:

Downtown 1.72

Residential Neighborhoods
 1.69 (LOWEST)

Industrial Areas 1.86

Commercial Districts/Highway Corridors
 1.99 (HIGHEST)

Question 14: Please share any additional thoughts that you have about the City of Gatesville, the services that it offers, quality of life issues, or anything else that you would like to share.

The final question asked respondents to share any additional thoughts they had about the City of Gatesville, such as city services, quality of life issues, or anything else they might want to share. There were 112 responses to this question, and some comments that are representative of the general themes from the responses received are listed below:

- Internet access is a problem.
- Zoning codes need to be enforced so that the City looks clean and welcoming (whole neighborhoods need code enforcement).
- Downtown improvements are needed.
- Street repairs are a necessity as well as enforcement for loud vehicles at all hours of the night.
- More restaurants, youth, and family-friendly activities would be a welcome improvement.
- Need additional mail drop boxes (blue boxes) throughout the City.
- Work hard to clean up the drug issues in the City.
- We need more and good job opportunities.
- We may need an idea director or coordinator to support a community-wide improvement effort.
- Property taxes make it difficult to live in the area.
- Development needs to enhance the positives of our small-town City, not remake ourselves in the image of some other city.
- We need good quality childcare services and programs for special needs children.
- Better post-secondary educational opportunities would be nice so residents do not have to drive an hour or get online.
- Invest in the history and historic places of the City.
- I do not get the same amount of services for the amount of taxes I pay (which has increased steeply).

1.3 VISION AND GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Following the receipt of community input, a new vision for the future of Gatesville was developed that draws upon the ideals of its residents. This vision statement is intended to help focus the community and its leaders on the core mission of the city, and serve as a barometer with which to guide future actions. Supporting the vision are a set of guiding principles that are intended to direct the implementation of the plan through strategic actions and policy recommendations.

VISION

"The City of Gatesville commits to providing a high quality of life for all its citizens while building on its unique character. Working collaboratively, we will foster pride, develop a vibrant economy, thoughtfully plan for the future, and preserve our small town feel."

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

INVESTMENT: The City of Gatesville will invest its resources in a manner that ensures that its municipal infrastructure, programs, and human resources meet both current needs and prepare the city for growth.

RENEWAL: The City of Gatesville will embrace and facilitate the positive renewal of the community through compatible growth, redevelopment, and expansion of economic opportunity.

BALANCE: The City of Gatesville will become a community that is well-balanced in all respects, including demographically and economically, as well as in its approach to growth and the environment.

GROWTH: The City of Gatesville will grow in an orderly and efficient manner that strengthens the local economy while preserving Gatesville's unique physical character that reinforces shared pride and responsibility.

Chapter 6: Land Use

6.1 Introduction

Historical Context

At the turn of the 20th Century, the Sanborn Map Company's survey of the City of Gatesville documented a bustling community of 2,200 residents centered on an "urban" area between Bridge Street and Saunders Street, extending from roughly 5th Street in the west to Lutterloh Avenue in the east. Mercantile buildings built with brick and stone surrounded the Coryell County Courthouse, while livery stables, wagon and lumber yards filled the surrounding blocks. At the time, the community boasted a public school, five hotels, public water works and an electric generating plant. As a market hub on the railroad, Gatesville had attracted significant industrial development by this time. In addition to the lumber yards, the city and surrounding area were home to a number of cotton gins, cotton oil presses and roller mills that served the region's agricultural economy. Residential neighborhoods spread east and west of downtown Gatesville along both sides of Main Street, with at least six churches serving as focal points for their neighborhoods.

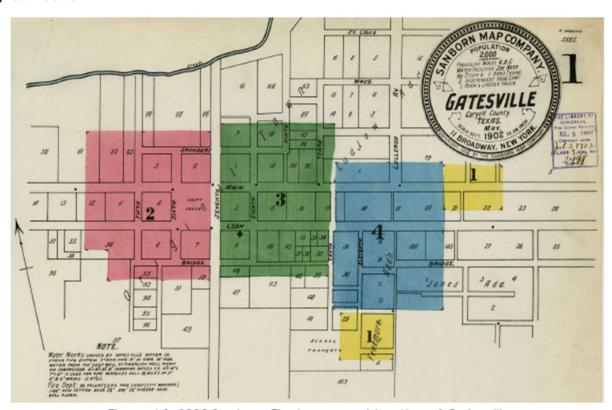
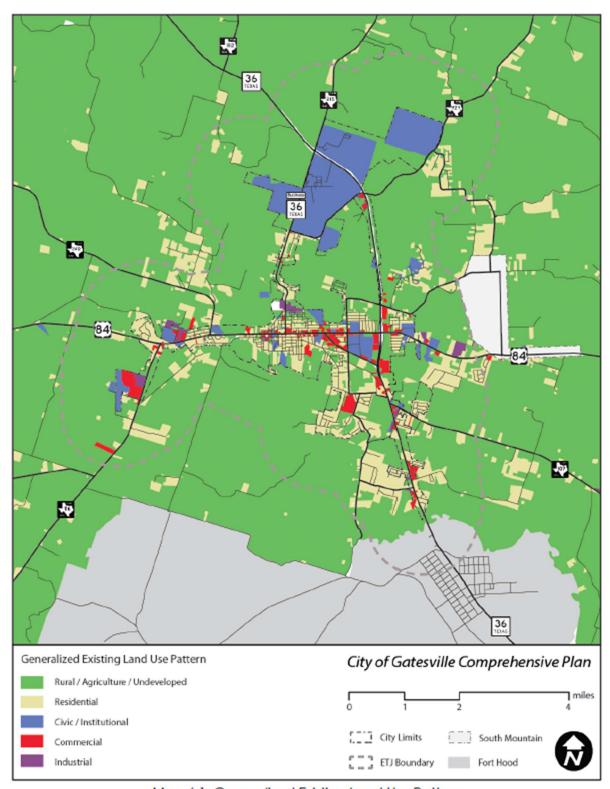


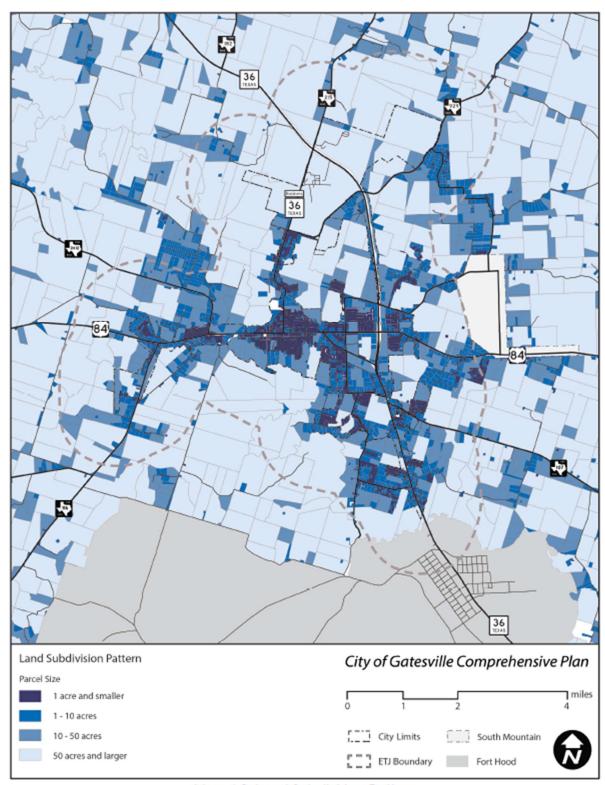
Figure 6.1: 1902 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map Key of Gatesville

Over time, the grid street network that laid the original foundation for the growth of the city grew eastward to the railroad, with residential neighborhoods being established both north and south of Main Street, which eventually became US Highway 84. Commercial development spread eastward from downtown as well, with auto-centric strip commercial development supplanting the old commercial core of the city. With the opening of the new State Highway 36 route on the east side of the city, commercial development then moved further eastward to take advantage of the changes in traffic patterns and the new land that was opened for development with the rerouting of the primary route of SH 36.

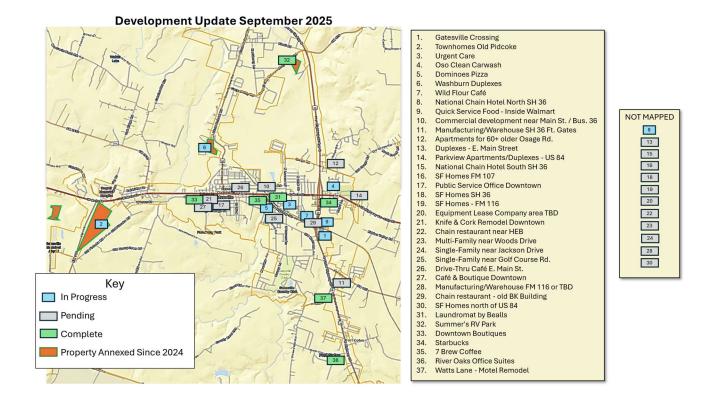


Map 6.1: Generalized Existing Land Use Pattern



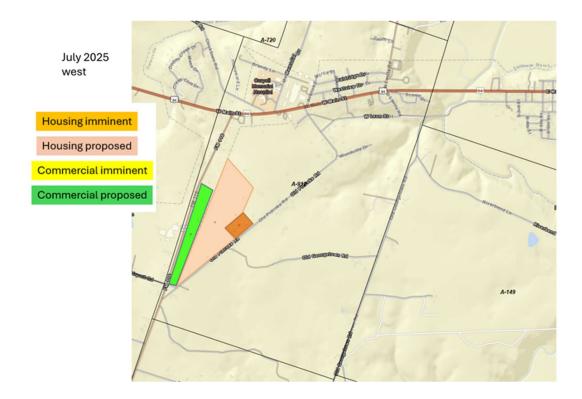
Map 6.2: Land Subdivision Pattern

The continued city-wide installation of fiber internet, along many other factors including comparatively low real estate costs in Coryell County, have proven to spur somewhat historic growth opportunities in 2024-2025. We have seen notable retail and residential development inquiries, and we expect these to continue. We are focusing on sustaining existing business while attracting new business-commercial development to Gatesville.





Within the city limits west of the Leon River, there has been recent interest in development in this area. Historically, Coryell Memorial Hospital, several industrial establishments and the Gatesville Municipal Airport, along with two small residential neighborhoods were the primary uses on the US 84 and FM 116 corridors on the west side of the city. In 2024-2025, Laerdal completed a large expansion project and over 80 acres nearby were listed for sale and development, with 8 of those acres now under residential development in 2025.



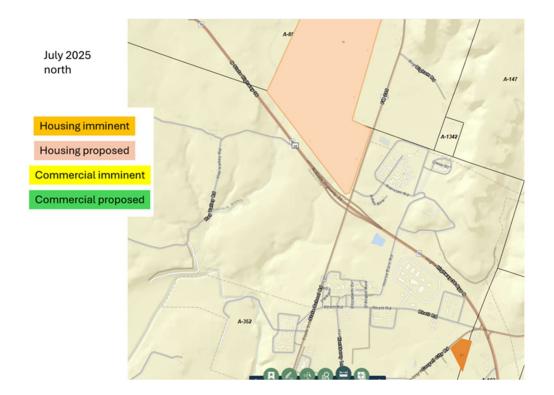
Growth to the east on US 84 expanded at a high rate in 2024-2025, where previously it had been confined primarily to the area around State Highway 36, with the city limits ending around the Gatesville Civic Center. East of the city limits, the Town of South Mountain and rougher topography limited opportunities for much more growth east of the city on the highway corridor.



Growth in south Gatesville has also risen dramatically in 2024-2205, where, historically, suburban density residential development extended south of the city, primarily on the west side of State Highway 36, encompassing the area between the river and the highway. The city limits stretch south along SH 36 almost to the Leon River and North Fort Hood, encompassing the corporate limits of the former Town of Fort Gates, which was subsumed into Gatesville in a large annexation.



While the city limits of Gatesville stretch over four miles north of the US 84 corridor and the core urbanized area of the city, the northern part of the city is primarily occupied with Texas Department of Criminal Justice facilities. Some growth has occurred in this area as well, including some commercial development along SH 36, as well as a small developed residential area on Business Route SH 36 / State School Road north of Stillhouse Branch near the TDCJ campus.



It is no longer accurate to assume that, In order to realize any significant level of growth in the future, the city and potential developers will have to look outside of the current city limits for new opportunities. In 2024 and 2025, City staff and Council have worked diligently to identify the constraints and develop plans to address them. The City now has a Water Master Plan and is working on a Wastewater Master Plan. As wastewater had been the #1 constraint to development, it has become our top priority. In 2025, the City took measures to address wastewater capacity in the Fort Gates area, completing in August 2025 a reroute of the lines leading from Lakewood lift station to SH 36 lines and lift stations. This measure alone creates an increase of approximately 20% in wastewater capacity in the Fort Gates area.

As Maps 6.1 and 6.2 demonstrate, there is a significant amount of undeveloped land within the city's ETJ and beyond. The following section lays out a revised plan for the city's future growth, based on updated information, goals, and priorities, as well as the availability of undeveloped land, infrastructure requirements, natural constraints and the need to grow in a manner that is compatible with both the city's current development pattern as well as avoiding areas of encroachment concern related to Fort Hood.

6.2 Future Land Use

Overview

This section of the Comprehensive Plan establishes an updated vision for the future growth and development of the City of Gatesville. This development vision, when combined with associated plans for transportation and utility infrastructure, public facilities, and services to support them form the basic growth policy for the city; giving guidance to the City Council, Planning and Zoning Commission, city staff, property owners, developers and the community as a whole about how and where the city is anticipated to grow and the types of investments that will be needed to support that growth vision.

As an aspirational planning guide, the Comprehensive Plan is intended to inform the adoption and amendment of development regulations and policies, such as the City's Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances. The plan, and future land use map, however do not specifically constitute a legal definition of zoning regulations or the specific boundaries of zoning districts. Rather, the plan helps to guide the City Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission as they implement the development vision through the city's regulatory framework. Following the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan, it is recommended, and expected, that development regulations will be updated to make them as consistent as possible with the plan, including proactively amending the zoning map, where appropriate, to better conform to the development vision. As a long term vision, not every area of potential change would be appropriate to implement immediately, especially if infrastructure investments are needed to support it.

Over time, as the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council review development proposals, capital improvement plans, and annexation requests, it is expected that they will consult the plan, and the Future Land Use Map in particular, to determine whether the proposal is consistent with the land use vision. While the plan does not bind any specific legislative action, such as a rezoning or annexation, if the Council one day finds that it is making a large number of decisions that are contrary to, or inconsistent with the plan then that indicates that it is likely time to undertake a review of the plan and adjust it as necessary to ensure that it is fulfilling its intended purpose. To that end, this 2025 update has been undertaken to address current information, development interest, goals, and priorities city-wide.

LAND USE CLASSIFICATION

For the purpose of creating the Future Land Use Map and establishing the city's development vision, a set of eight land use classifications were developed. Like the map itself, these land use classifications are not intended to equate to zoning regulations, but rather guide the city as it

reviews its ordinances as it begins the process of implementing the 2025 updates to the Comprehensive Plan. The following pages of the plan provide additional information and background on each of the land use classifications used on the map. Included on each page are a short description of the classification, an aerial photo depicting the general visual context, a land use component chart that depicts the relative proportion of general land use types, a chart showing the type and relative importance of different modes of transportation, and a development context chart that indicates the intensity / density of development. The eight future land use classifications that were used to develop the map, in order of general intensity, are:

- Conservation
- Rural / Agricultural
- Suburban Residential
- Urban Residential
- Civic / Institutional
- Commercial
- Industrial
- State Prison Complex

Map 6.3, shows the application of the eight land use classifications within the City of Gatesville and its ETJ, as well as surrounding areas that are within the city's sphere of influence. In developing the map, a number of factors were considered when assigning the specific land uses and forming the overall future growth and development framework for the city. Among the primary factors in the development of the map were access to both existing and planned transportation and utility infrastructure, the availability of land that is suitable for development in terms of parcel sizes and natural/ environmental constraints, the character of the area - including compatibility with established neighborhoods, compatibility between uses of different intensities (such as between residential and industrial areas), opportunities for economic development, and compatibility with the military training mission at Fort Hood (discussed in more detail in Section 6.3).

Future Land Use Map

The resulting Future Land Use Map blends together the different land use classifications into a rational development plan that takes advantage of 2020 information and is now updated in 2025 with current and future opportunities for growth while balancing these against the constraints that exist. The following describes in more detail the underlying thought process behind the application of the specific land use classifications to the map.

CONSERVATION

The Conservation land use classification was used primarily to identify land that, due to environmental constraints and natural hazards, would be difficult to develop. As these areas typically follow floodplains, their preservation as natural areas and open space provide benefits to the entire community by helping to protect water quality, allowing floodwaters to spill over banks in areas free of obstructions, and present opportunities for the development of greenway trails.

RURAL I AGRICULTURAL

The Rural / Agricultural land use classification was applied to areas that the city does not anticipate demand for development due to a lack of either existing or planned infrastructure, the potential for land use compatibility issues, and to preserve and protect the significant ranching and farming economy of the area from encroachment by urban development. Areas close to the city that have this designation also serve as a long-term land bank for future growth, if needed, and if future infrastructure plans are developed to improve access to transportation and utility infrastructure. To that end, the 2025 update alters many Agricultural classifications to other uses, such as Suburban Residential.

URBAN AND SUBURBAN RESIDENT/AL

Within the city limits, the Urban Residential classification was applied primarily to existing neighborhoods located along the US 84 corridor as well as the small amount of undeveloped land adjacent to these existing neighborhoods in the core of the city. The 2025 update adds approximately 1,110 acres for this usage. Neighborhoods that were developed in a less dense manner, including those between the Leon River and SH 36 in the southern part of the city and elsewhere within the ETJ were designated as Suburban Residential. This was also used as the primary classification to designate areas for the development of new neighborhoods to accommodate demand for new housing and population growth over time.

New suburban density residential development areas are shown on both sides of the SH 36 corridor, with infill development of smaller subdivisions contemplated in the area south of US 84 and west of SH 36 - taking advantage of the existing neighborhood development pattern in this area. North of US 84, a small residential development area south of the TDCJ campus is shown on the west side of SH 36. The northeastern quadrant of US 84 / SH 36 is shown as a Suburban Residential development area as well, but it is anticipated that due to challenges related to topography in this area, that development will be on the lower end of the density scale. Significant additions in Suburban Residential use also occur with the 2025 update, to the total of approximately 2,734 acres added.

In order to accommodate potential development demand generated by the improvement of FM 116 and associated growth on the southern end of the highway, a significant amount of land has been designated with the Suburban Residential classification on the west side of the Leon River, centered on the intersection of FM 116 and US 84. This area provides significant opportunities for new growth, but major residential development activity in this area will likely come with significant infrastructure costs. Planning for the necessary improvements will need to be done deliberately, while reactive or unplanned investments for residential growth in this area are discouraged.

Map 6.4 on the following page details the primary residential land supply that is available r under the development vision that is established on the Future Land Use Map. Parcels over 20 acres in size with an Urban or Suburban land use classification are identified on the map, as they form the likely backbone of the city's future growth. Altogether, these parcels encompass nearly 7,000 acres of land, including over 4,400 acres of land in parcels that are 50 acres or larger in size. It is certainly not anticipated that even a significant minority of this land will be developed in the foreseeable future, given the sheer amount of land available. Given the realities and unpredictability of the market, however, it was determined that designation of this amount of land would be prudent to ensure sufficient opportunities for rational growth.

CIVIC I INSTITUTIONAL

As the seat of Coryell County government and primary city in the northern part of the county, Gatesville hosts a significant number of major civic and institutional uses. Among these are the Coryell Memorial Hospital, the Gatesville Civic Center, the Gatesville Independent School District campus, as well as a number of parks and recreational facilities. Ensuring that these uses, which contribute significantly to the quality of life of residents of the city and the wider region are both preserved and allowed to expand and redevelop as necessary is critical to the city's success. In addition to the designation of existing facilities and uses, the Future Land Use Map also identifies other areas of opportunity, that, if desired could be developed as additional parks, recreational facilities, and other necessary uses that can benefit the entire community. The 2025 update adds the Municipal Airport under this classification.

COMMERCIAL

Areas designated with the Commercial land use classification span a wide range of functional development styles, ranging from the city's historic downtown, to the legacy of commercial strip development that grew along US 84, to more recently developed highway commercial areas along the SH 36 corridor. As a regional center of commerce for northern Coryell County and beyond, Gatesville is home to a significant amount of commercial development for a city of its size. The Commercial land use designation was primarily applied along existing commercial development corridors, including both developed and undeveloped land to accommodate future growth. The

2025 update increases frontage along major highways and thoroughfares in and near the city. Of particular note, the Future Land Use Map designates areas along SH 36 north of the US 84 interchange for commercial development, as well as a large area on US 84 west of the city, which is intended to serve the residential growth area that is centered on US 84 and FM 116 (note: this was reduced in the 2025 update to allow for additional Urban Residential growth). The latter area is not recommended for major commercial development until such time that the residential component of that area begins to develop.

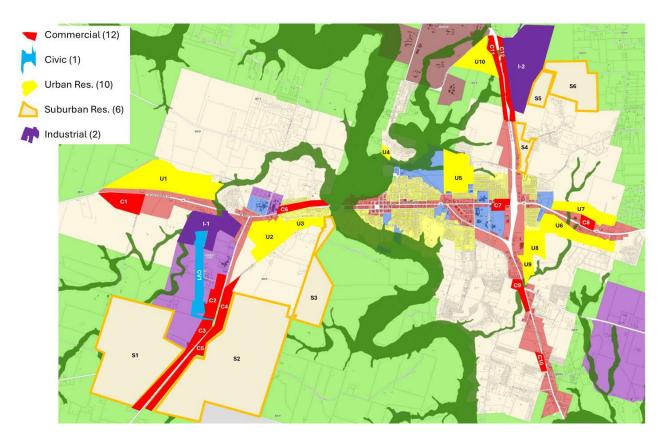
INDUSTRIAL

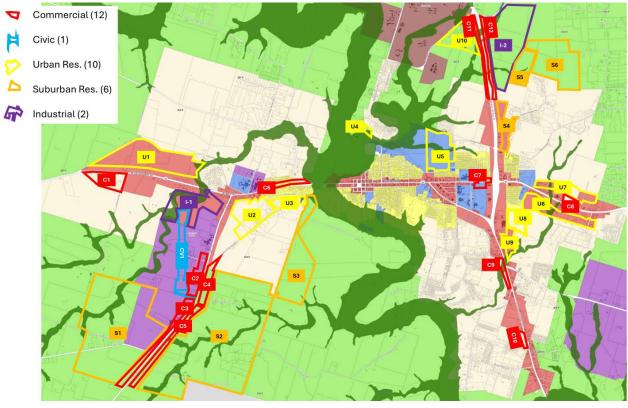
The preservation of existing industrial development and identification of potential growth areas for locating new industries is a critical component of the city's long term economic health. Given the unique nature and needs of industrial development, along with the potential compatibility issues with lower intensity land uses, it is important that these areas be sited properly and protected from encroachment. In addition to existing industrial areas in the city, the Industrial classification has been expanded around the airport, extending south along FM 116 to protect this critical asset and enhance compatible growth for both the airport and Fort Hood. A large area on both sides of FM 107 east of SH 36 has also been designated for industrial development to take advantage of the significant land resources and access to transportation infrastructure. In total, there are nearly 2,400 acres of land designated for industrial use (see Map 6.5) between the two primary development areas. In both areas, it is recommended that the city work with willing landowners to proactively prepare plans to attract well-planned industrial development. Changes in the 2025 update centered on developing logical areas for industrial development, increasing availability near the airport and on the north side of the city.

STATE PRISON COMPLEX

The TDCJ facilities on the north side of Gatesville have been designated with this land use classification to ensure that the discrete boundaries of the prison complex are taken into account as infrastructure and development plans are prepared in the future. Given the nature of the land use, it is both a major asset to the city given the employment that it generates, but also a major constraint on development north of the core of the city. From a land use perspective, it is important for the city to ensure that the surrounding area remain compatible with the ongoing operation of the complex.

Commercial

The goal for the 2025 changes to commercial land use was to increase frontage along major highways and thoroughfares in and near the city. Where commercial land use was replaced with another use type, it generally involved non-frontage areas and allowed for either increased Industrial or Urban Residential use.

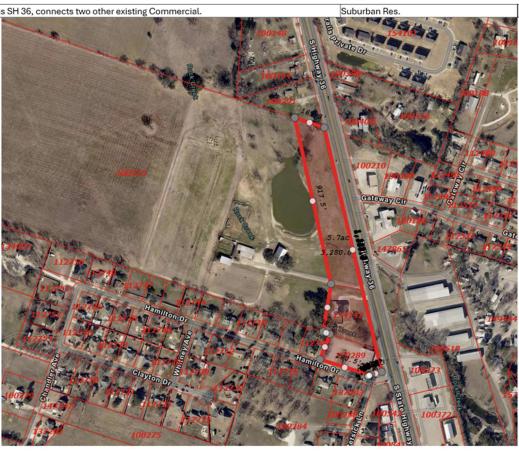












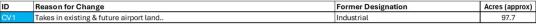

Urban Residential

Based on numerous directives and comments from City Council, citizens, and staff, the goal for the 2025 changes to urban residential use was to develop more affordable housing options via increasing the availability of this type of land. The 10 proposed changes replace other land uses of all types from the 2020 map, including non-frontage Commercial, Suburban Residential, Agricultural, and Civic.

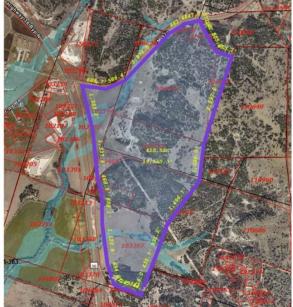

CHAPTER 6: LAND USE

6.1 INTRODUCTION

HISTORICAL CONTEXT

At the turn of the 20th Century, the Sanborn Map Company's survey of the City of Gatesville documented a busting community of 2,200 residents centered on an "urban" area between Bridge Street and Saunders Street, extending from roughly 5th Street in the west to Lutterloh Avenue in the east. Mercantile buildings built with brick and stone surrounded the Coryell County Courthouse, while livery stables, wagon and lumber yards filled the surrounding blocks. At the time, the community boasted a public school, five hotels, public water works and an electric generating plant. As a market hub on the railroad, Gatesville had attracted significant industrial development by this time. In addition to the lumber yards, the city and surrounding area were home to a number of cotton gins, cotton oil presses and roller mills that served the region's agricultural economy. Residential neighborhoods spread east and west of downtown Gatesville along both sides of Main Street, with at least six churches serving as focal points for their neighborhoods.

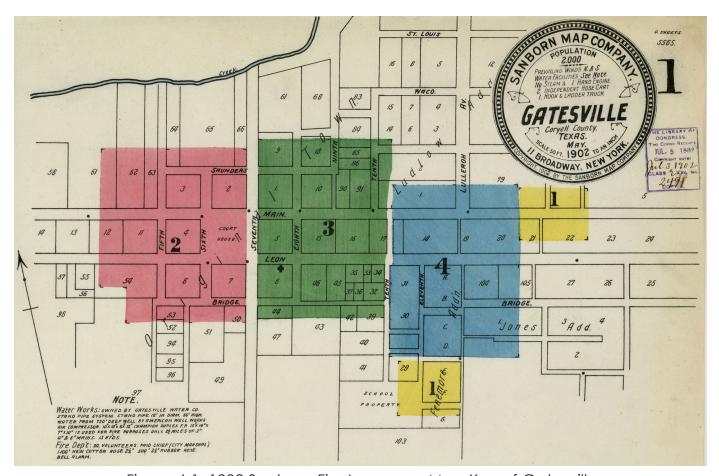


Figure 6.1: 1902 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map Key of Gatesville

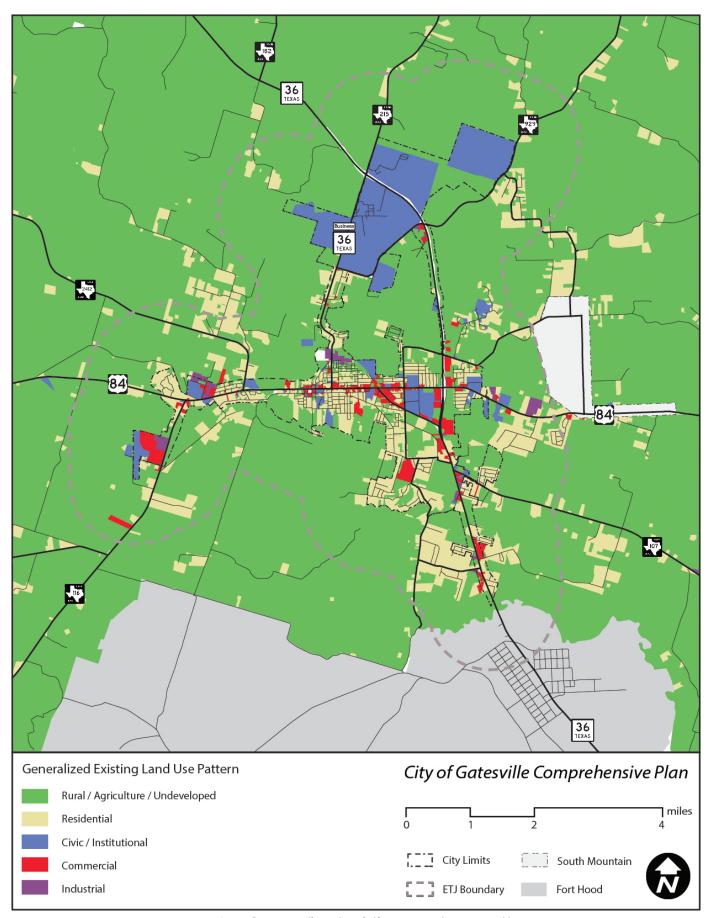
Over time, the grid street network that laid the original foundation for the growth of the city grew eastward to the railroad, with residential neighborhoods being established both north and south of Main Street, which eventually became US Highway 84. Commercial development spread eastward from downtown as well, with auto-centric strip commercial development supplanting the old commercial core of the city. With the opening of the new State Highway 36 route on the east side of the city, commercial development then moved further eastward to take advantage of the changes in traffic patterns and the new land that was opened for development with the rerouting of the primary route of SH 36.

EXISTING CONDITIONS

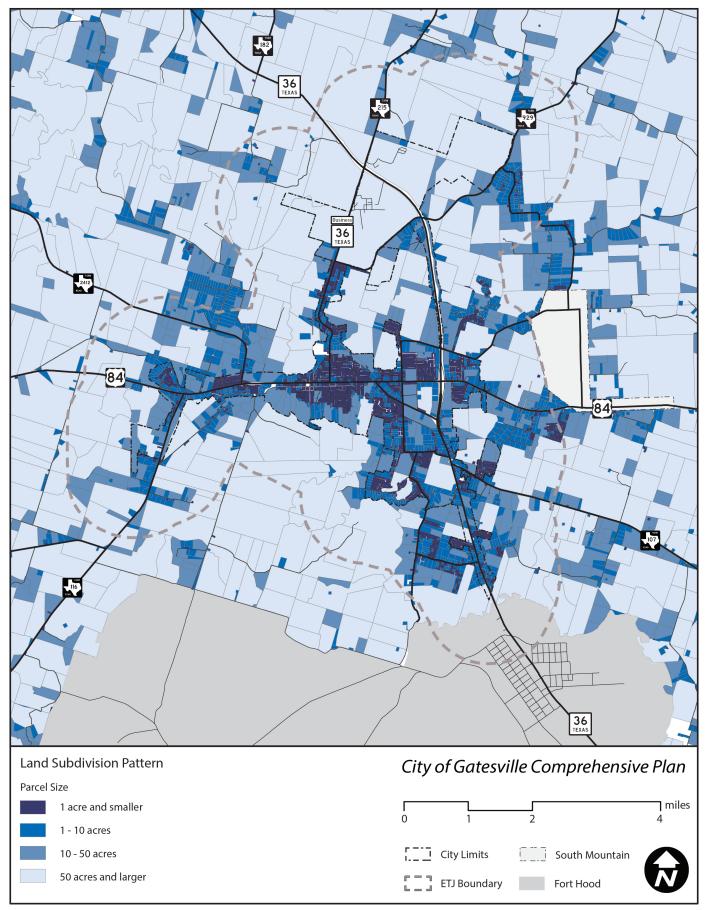
Although the city limits stretch west of the Leon River, there has been relatively little development in this area, with the Coryell Memorial Hospital, several industrial establishments and the Gatesville Municipal Airport, along with two small residential neighborhoods being the primary uses on the US 84 and FM 116 corridors on the west side of the city. Growth to the east on US 84 has been confined primarily to the area around State Highway 36, with the city limits ending around the Gatesville Civic Center. East of the city limits, thew Town of South Mountain and rougher topography limit opportunities for much more growth east of the city on the highway corridor.

Suburban density residential development extends south of the city, primarily on the west side of State Highway 36, encompassing the area between the river and the highway. The city limits stretch south along SH 36 almost to the Leon River and North Fort Hood, encompassing the corporate limits of the former Town of Fort Gates, which was subsumed into Gatesville in a large annexation. While the city limits of Gatesville stretch over four miles north of the US 84 corridor and the core urbanized area of the city, the northern part of the city is primarily occupied with Texas Department of Criminal Justice facilities. Exceptions to this include some commercial development along SH 36, as well as a small developed residential area on Business Route SH 36 / State School Road north of Stillhouse Branch near the TDCJ campus.

The overwhelming majority of the land within the corporate limits is currently developed or is subject to some underlying constraint that would impair its development. In order to realize any significant level of growth in the future, the city and potential developers will have to look outside of the current city limits for new opportunities. As Maps 6.1 and 6.2 demonstrate, there is a significant amount of undeveloped land within the city's ETJ and beyond. The following section lays out a plan for the city's future growth based on the availability of undeveloped land, infrastructure requirements, natural constraints and the need to grow in a manner that is compatible with both the city's current development pattern as well as avoiding areas of encroachment concern related to Fort Hood.

6.2 FUTURE LAND USE

OVERVIEW

This section of the Comprehensive Plan establishes a vision for the future growth and development of the City of Gatesville. This development vision, when combined with associated plans for transportation and utility infrastructure, public facilities, and services to support them form the basic growth policy for the city; giving guidance to the City Council, Planning Commission, city staff, property owners, developers and the community as a whole about how and where the city is anticipated to grow and the types of investments that will be needed to support that growth vision.

As an aspirational planning guide, the Comprehensive Plan is intended to inform the adoption and amendment of development regulations and policies, such as the City's Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances. The plan, and future land use map, however do not specifically constitute a legal definition of zoning regulations or the specific boundaries of zoning districts. Rather, the plan helps to guide the City Council and Planning Commission as they implement the development vision through the city's regulatory framework. Following the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan, it is recommended, and expected, that development regulations will be updated to make them as consistent as possible with the plan, including proactively amending the zoning map, where appropriate, to better conform to the development vision. As a long term vision, not every area of potential change would be appropriate to implement immediately, especially if infrastructure investments are needed to support it.

Over time, as the Planning Commission and City Council review development proposals, capital improvement plans, and annexation requests, it is expected that they will consult the plan, and the Future Land Use Map in particular, to determine whether the proposal is consistent with the land use vision. While the plan does not bind any specific legislative action, such as a rezoning or annexation, If the Council one day finds that it is making a large number of decisions that are contrary to, or inconsistent with, the plan, then that indicates that it is likely time to undertake a review of the plan and adjust it as necessary to ensure that it is fulfilling its intended purpose.

LAND USE CLASSIFICATION

For the purpose of creating the Future Land Use Map and establishing the city's development vision, a set of eight land use classifications were developed. Like the map itself, these land use classifications are not intended to equate to zoning regulations, but rather guide the

city as it reviews its ordinances as it begins the process of implementing the Comprehensive Plan. The following pages of the plan provide additional information and background on each of the land use classifications used on the map. Included on each page are a short description of the classification, an aerial photo depicting the general visual context, a land use component chart that depicts the relative proportion of general land use types, a chart showing the type and relative importance of different modes of transportation, and a development context chart that indicates the intensity / density of development. The eight future land use classifications that were used to develop the map, in order of general intensity, are:

- Conservation
- Rural / Agricultural
- Suburban Residential
- Urban Residential
- Civic / Institutional
- Commercial
- Industrial
- State Prison Complex

Map 6.3, shows the application of the eight land use classifications withing the City of Gatesville and its ETJ, as well as surrounding areas that are within the city's sphere of influence. In developing the map, a number of factors were considered when assigning the specific land uses and forming the overall future growth and development framework for the city. Among the primary factors in the development of the map were access to both existing and planned transportation and utility infrastructure, the availability of land that is suitable for development in terms of parcel sizes and natural / environmental constraints, the character of the area - including compatibility with established neighborhoods, compatibility between uses of different intensities (such as between residential and industrial areas), opportunities for economic development, and compatibility with the military training mission at Fort Hood (discussed in more detail in Section 6.3).

CONSERVATION

The Conservation land use classification is intended for application to areas where natural hazards and environmental constraints make development difficult. These areas would remain virtually undeveloped, with the exception of passive recreation uses, such as greenways, as well as limited public utility infrastructure where required.

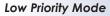

FUTURE LAND USE MAP

The resulting Future Land Use Map blends together the different land use classifications into a rational development plan that takes advantage of current and future opportunities for growth while balancing these against the constraints that exist. The following describes in more detail the underlying thought process behind the application of the specific land use classifications to the map.

CONSERVATION

The Conservation land use classification was used primarily to identify land that, due to environmental constraints and natural hazards, would be difficult to develop. As these areas typically follow floodplains, their preservation as natural areas and open space provide benefits to the entire community by helping to protect water quality, allowing floodwaters to spill over banks in areas free of obstructions, and present opportunities for the development of greenway trails.

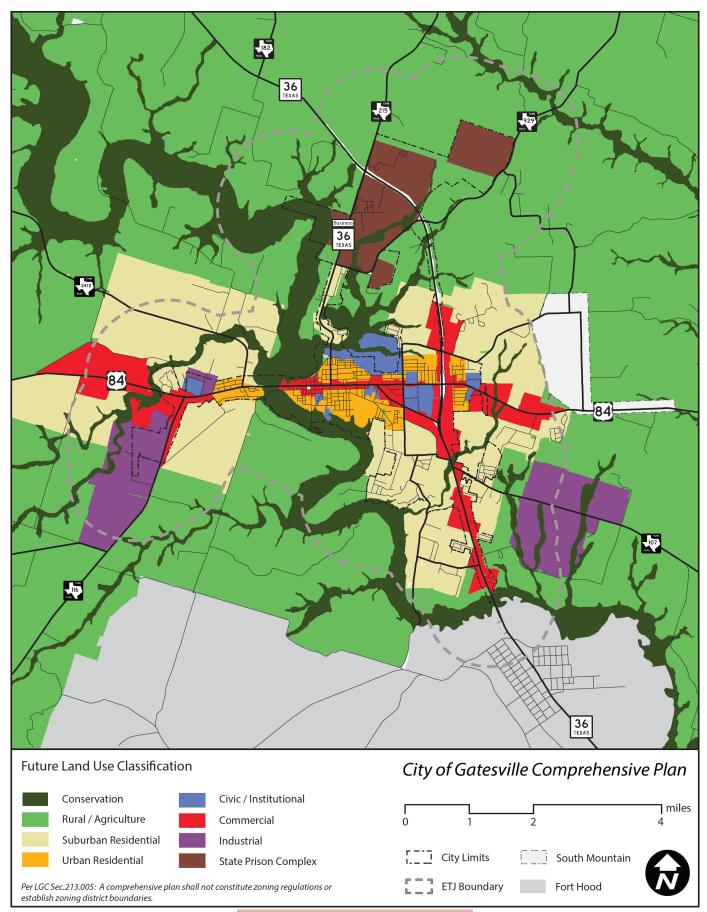
RURAL / AGRICULTURAL

The Rural / Agricultural land use classification was applied to areas that the city does not anticipate demand for development due to a lack of either existing or planned infrastructure, the potential for land use compatibility issues, and to preserve and protect the significant ranching and farming economy of the area from encroachment by urban development. Areas close to the city that have this designation also serve as a long-term land bank for future growth, if needed, and if future infrastructure plans are developed to improve access to transportation and utility infrastructure.

URBAN AND SUBURBAN RESIDENTIAL

Within the city limits, the Urban Residential classification was applied primarily to existing neighborhoods located along the US 84 corridor as well as the small amount of undeveloped land adjacent to these existing neighborhoods in the core of the city. Neighborhoods that were developed in a less dense manner, including those between the Leon River and SH 36 in the southern part of the city and elsewhere within the ETJ were designated as Suburban Residential. This was also used as the primary classification to designate areas for the development of new neighborhoods to accommodate demand for new housing and population growth over time.

New suburban density residential development areas are shown on both sides of the SH 36 corridor, with infill development of smaller subdivisions contemplated in the area south of US 84 and west of SH 36 - taking advantage of the existing neighborhood development



Map 6.3: Future Land Use Map

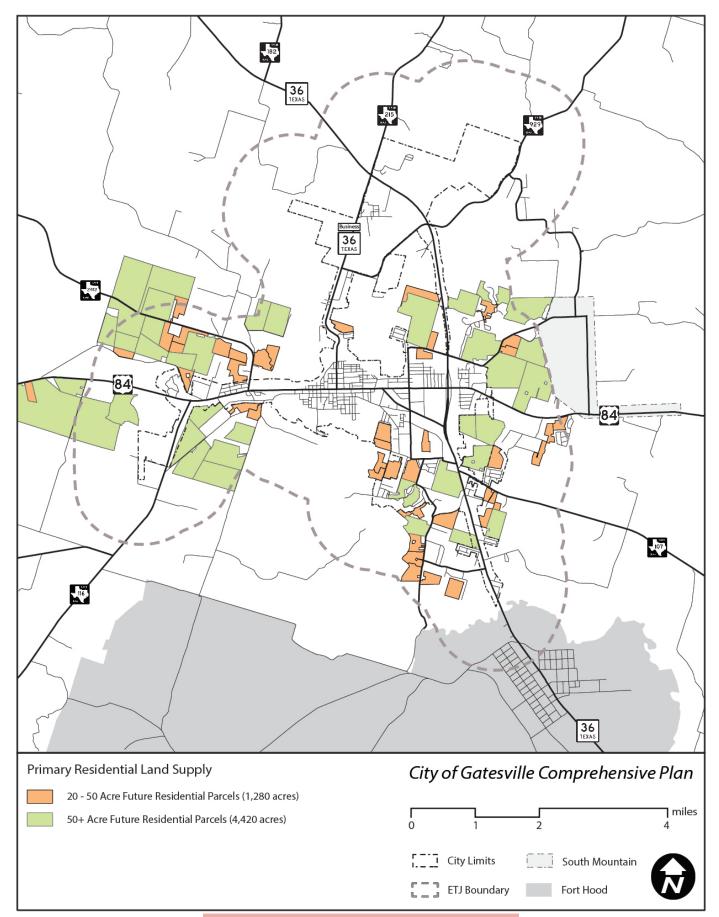
pattern in this area. North of US 84, a small residential development area south of the TDCJ campus is shown on the west side of SH 36. The northeastern quadrant of US 84 / SH 36 is shown as a Suburban Residential development area as well, but it is anticipated that due to challenges related to topography in this area, that development will be on the lower end of the density scale.

In order to accommodate potential development demand generated by the improvement of FM 116 and associated growth on the southern end of the highway, a significant amount of land has been designated with the Suburban Residential classification on the west side of the Leon River, centered on the intersection of FM 116 and US 84. This area provides significant opportunities for new growth, but major residential development activity in this area will likely come with significant infrastructure costs. Planning for the necessary improvements will need to be done deliberately, while reactive or unplanned investments for residential growth in this area are discouraged.

Map 6.4 on the following page details the primary residential land supply that is available under the development vision that is established on the Future Land Use Map. Parcels over 20 acres in size with an Urban or Suburban land use classification are identified on the map, as they form the likely backbone of the city's future growth. Altogether, these parcels encompass nearly 7,000 acres of land, including over 4,400 acres of land in parcels that are 50 acres or larger in size. It is certainly not anticipated that even a significant minority of this land will be developed in the foreseeable future, given the sheer amount of land available. Given the realities and unpredictability of the market, however, it was determined that designation of this amount of land would be prudent to ensure sufficient opportunities for rational growth.

CIVIC / INSTITUTIONAL

As the seat of Coryell County government and primary city in the northern part of the county, Gatesville hosts a significant number of major civic and institutional uses. Among these are the Coryell Memorial Hospital, the Gatesville Civic Center, the Gatesville Independent School District campus, as well as a number of parks and recreational facilities. Ensuring that these uses, which contribute significantly to the quality of life of residents of the city and the wider region are both preserved and allowed to expand and redevelop as necessary is critical to the city's success. In addition to the designation of existing facilities and uses, the Future Land Use Map also identifies other areas of opportunity, that, if desired could be developed as additional parks, recreational facilities, and other necessary uses that can benefit the entire community.

COMMERCIAL

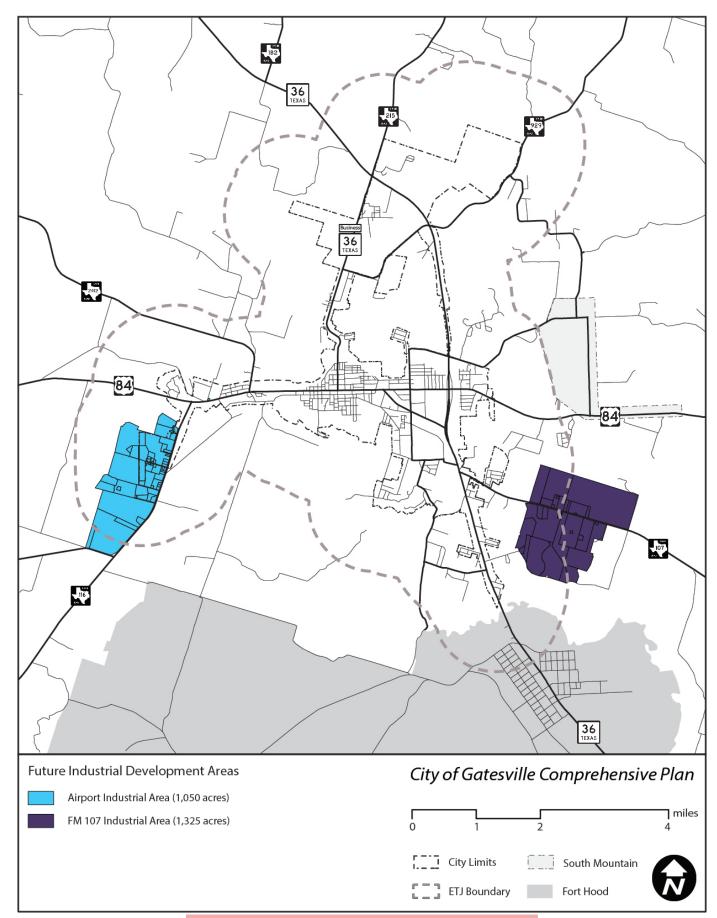
Areas designated with the Commercial land use classification span a wide range of functional development styles, ranging from the city's historic downtown, to the legacy of commercial strip development that grew along US 84, to more recently developed highway commercial areas along the SH 36 corridor. As a regional center of commerce for northern Coryell County and beyond, Gatesville is home to a significant amount of commercial development for a city of its size. The Commercial land use designation was primarily applied along existing commercial development corridors, including both developed and undeveloped land to accommodate future growth. Of particular note, the Future Land Use Map designates areas along SH 36 north of the US 84 interchange for commercial development, as well as a large area on US 84 west of the city, which is intended to serve the residential growth area that is centered on US 84 and FM 116. The latter area is not recommended for major commercial development until such time that the residential component of that area begins to develop.

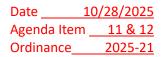
The preservation of existing industrial development and identification of potential growth areas for locating new industries is a critical component of the city's long term economic health. Given the unique nature and needs of industrial development, along with the potential compatibility issues with lower intensity land uses. it is important that these areas be sited properly and protected from encroachment. In addition to existing industrial areas in the city, the Industrial classification has been expanded around the airport, extending south along FM 116 to protect this critical asset and enhance compatible growth for both the airport and Fort Hood. A large area on both sides of FM 107 east of SH 36 has also been designated for industrial development to take advantage of the significant land resources and access to transportation infrastructure. In total, there are nearly 2,400 acres of land designated for industrial use (see Map 6.5) between the two primay development areas. In both areas, it is recommended that the city work with willing landowners to proactively prepare plans to attract well-planned industrial development.

STATE PRISON COMPLEX

The TDCJ facilities on the north side of Gatesville have been designated with this land use classification to ensure that the discrete boundaries of the prison complex are taken into account as infrastructure and development plans are prepared in the future. Given the nature of the land use, it is both a major asset to the city given the employment that it generates, but also a major constraint on development north of the core of the city. From a land use perspective, it is important for the city to ensure that the surrounding area remain compatible with the ongoing operation of the complex.

Staff Recommendation:

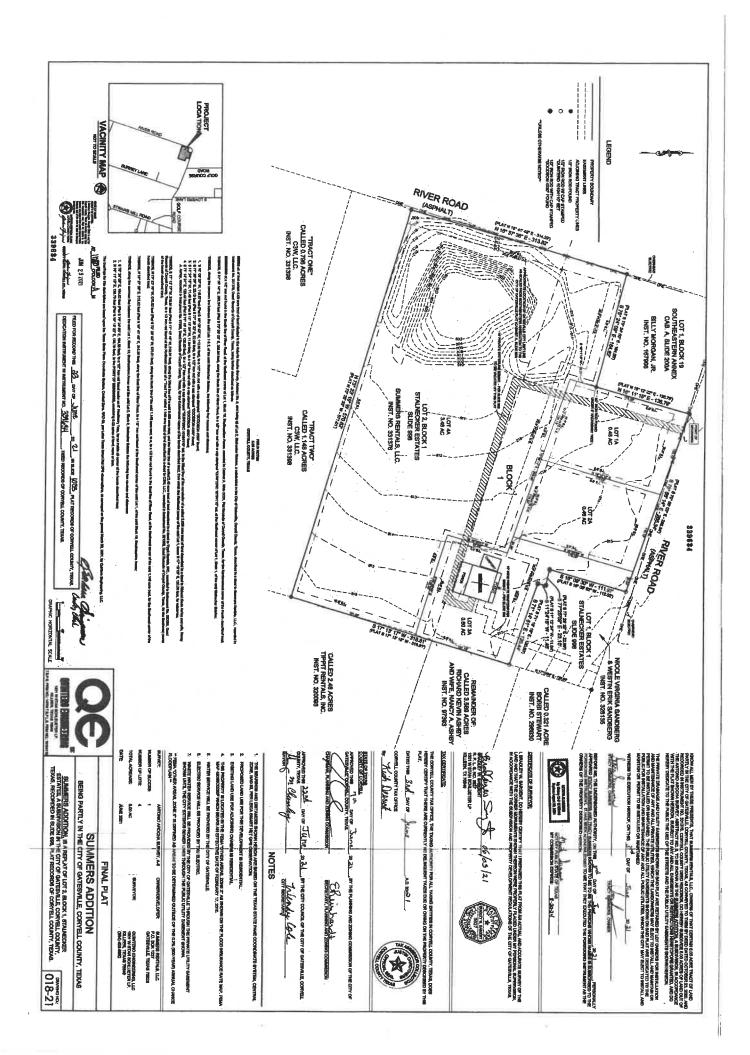

ORDINANCE NO 2025-21

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING AN APPROXIMATELY 3.46 ACRE TRACT OF LAND LOCATED IN THE SUMMER ADDN; BLOCK 1, LOT 4A SITUATED IN CORYELL COUNTY, TEXAS AND EXTENDING THE BOUNDARY LIMITS OF SAID CITY SO AS TO INCLUDE SUCH PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY'S CORPORATE LIMITS; GRANTING TO ALL THE INHABITANTS AND OWNERS OF SAID PROPERTY ALL THE RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF OTHER CITIZENS AND BINDING SAID INHABITANTS BY ALL OF THE ACTS, ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS, AND REGULATIONS OF SAID CITY; AND ADOPTING A SERVICE PLAN FOR SAID PROEPRTY; PROVIDING A CONFLICTS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, §43 of the Texas Local Government Code authorizes the City of Gatesville, Texas, an incorporated city, to engage in the annexation of territory, subject to the laws of this state, and;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Gatesville has been presented with a petition requesting annexation of an approximately 3.46 acres located in the Summer Addn.; Block 1, Lot 4A situated in Coryell County, in the City of Gatesville, Coryell County, Texas and being more particularly described and depicted in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, the notices and public hearings required by Chapter 43, Texas Local Government Code and other applicable law have been given and conducted; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted a service plan as required by Section 43.056 of the Texas Local Government Code relating to the Property, the terms of which are attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as Exhibit "B" (the "Service Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Property lies adjacent to the existing corporate limits of the City of Gatesville, Texas and is located within the exclusive extraterritorial jurisdiction of the city of Gatesville, Texas; and

WHEREAS, the requirements and procedures prescribed by the Texas Local Government Code and the Charter of the City of Gatesville, Texas, and the laws of this state for annexation of the Property have been duly followed; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Gatesville has concluded that the Property should be annexed to and made a part of the City of Gatesville, Texas;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. Based on the findings of fact set forth in the recitals above, which are

found to be true and correct and are incorporated herein as if set forth in full, the Property is hereby annexed into the corporate limits of the City of Gatesville, Texas.

- **SECTION 2.** The boundary limits of the City of Gatesville shall be and the same are hereby extended to include the Property within the City's corporate limits and the territory described herein shall be and is hereby included within the corporate limits, subject to all the acts, ordinances, resolutions, and regulations of the City. The inhabitants of the Property shall hereafter be entitled to all the rights and privileges of other citizens of the City of Gatesville and they shall be bound by the acts, ordinances, resolutions, and regulations of said City.
 - **SECTION 3.** The Service Plan, Exhibit "B," for the area is hereby adopted..
- **SECTION 4.** To the extent of any irreconcilable conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance and other ordinances of the City of Gatesville governing the use and development of the Property and which are not expressly amended by this Ordinance, the provisions of this Ordinance shall be controlling.
- **SECTION 5.** All provisions of the ordinances of the City of Gatesville, Texas, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby, repealed, and all other provisions of the ordinances of the City not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.
- **SECTION 6.** Should any sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, and shall not affect the validity of the Code of Ordinances as a whole.
- **SECTION 7.** The City Secretary is hereby directed to file with the County Clerk of Coryell County Texas, a certified copy of this ordinance.
- **SECTION 8.** This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and the publication of the caption, as the law in such cases provides.

ANNEXATION SERVICE PLAN AGREEMENT

For land described in Ordinance 2025-___ effective on the date of annexation, the following services are to be provided as set forth below:

1. POLICE PROTECTION

The City of Gatesville, Texas will provide police protection to the newly annexed tract at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City of Gatesville, Texas, with similar topography, land use and population within the newly annexed area.

2. FIRE PROTECTION AND AMBULANCE SERVICE

The City of Gatesville, Texas will provide fire protection and ambulance service to the newly annexed tract at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City of Gatesville, Texas, with similar topography, land use and population with the City of Gatesville.

3. SOLID WASTE COLLECTION AND RECYCLING PROGRAM

At the present time the City of Gatesville, Texas. is using a designated, specified contractor for collection of solid waste and refuse and a recycling program within the city limits of the City of Gatesville, Texas. Upon payment of any required deposits and the agreement to pay lawful service fees and charges, solid waste collection and recycling program will be provided to citizens in the newly annexed area to the extent that the City's contractor has access to the area to be serviced. Also, periodic community wide roll-off disposal of hazardous household waste will be available.

4. MAINTENANCE OF WATER AND WASTEWATER FACILITIES

Any and all water or wastewater facilities owned or maintained by the City of Gatesville, Texas, at the time of the proposed annexation shall continue to be maintained by the City of Gatesville, Texas. Any and all water or wastewater facilities which may be acquired subsequent to the annexation of the proposed area shall be maintained by the City of Gatesville, Texas, to the extent of its ownership.

5. MAINTENANCE OF ROADS AND STREETS

Any and all public roads, streets or alleyways which have been dedicated to the City of Gatesville, Texas, or which are owned by the City of Gatesville, Texas, shall be maintained to the same degree and extent that other roads, streets and alleyways are maintained in areas with similar topography, land use and population density. Any and all lighting of roads, streets and alleyways which may be positioned in a right-of-way, roadway or utility company easement shall be maintained by the applicable utility company servicing the City of Gatesville, Texas, pursuant to the rules, regulations and fees of such utility.

6. MAINTENANCE OF PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS AND SWIMMING POOLS

The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, is not aware of the existence of any parks, playgrounds or swimming pools now located in the area proposed for annexation. In the event any such parks, playgrounds or swimming pools do exist and are public facilities, the City of Gatesville, Texas, will maintain such areas to the same extent and degree that it maintains parks, playgrounds and swimming pools and other similar areas of the City now incorporated in the City of Gatesville, Texas.

7. MAINTENANCE OF MUNICIPALLY OWNED FACILITY, BUILDING OR MUNICIPAL SERVICE

The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas is not aware of the existence of any municipally owned facility, building or other municipal service now located in the area proposed for annexation. In the event any such municipally owned facility, building or municipal service does exist and are public facilities, the City of Gatesville, Texas, will maintain such areas to the same extent and degree that it maintains publicly owned facilities, buildings or municipal services of the City now incorporated in the City of Gatesville, Texas.

8. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

A. GENERAL

The City provides water and wastewater treatment facilities and major distribution and collection facilities to areas within the City for which the City is authorized to provide such services (this does not include areas for which a certificate of convenience and necessity has been issued to a special district or other water provider). The City does not extend water distribution or wastewater collection mains at its own cost to new developments as part of its municipal services; instead, property owners are expected to bear such costs. Water and wastewater mains will be extended only on an as needed basis when development applications or subdivision plats that require urban level supporting services are submitted to the City in accordance with the City's subdivision and development ordinances. Once such developments begin to occur, the City also may adopt capital improvements plans for additional treatment or major distribution or collection facilities to serve the area, while property owners must pay for the mains necessary to serve their land.

B. POLICE PROTECTION, FIRE PROTECTION AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas finds and determines it to be unnecessary to acquire or construct any capital improvement for the purpose of providing police protection, fire protection, or emergency medical services. The City Council finds and determines that it has at the present time adequate facilities to provide the same type, kind and level of protection and service which is presently being administered to other areas already incorporated in the City of Gatesville, Texas, with the same or similar topography, land use and population density, without reducing by more than a negligible amount the level of fire, police and emergency services provided within the corporate limits of the City.

C. WATER FACILITIES

The area to be annexed shall be annexed into the City of Gatesville Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) and water will be provided by the City. Capital improvements are not necessary to provide full municipal services for water.

D. WASTEWATER FACILITIES

The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, has determined that given the current expected development in the next ten (10) years within the area to be annexed, if such development concerning the extension or expansion of wastewater facilities will be in accordance with the City's utility policies as generally set forth in section 8A of this Plan, in the City's development regulations and the service plan. Upon connection to existing mains, sewer will be provided at rates established by the City.

E. ROADS AND STREETS

Within 2 ½ years the City of Gatesville, Texas, with a cooperative effort of the City's designated utility company, will undertake to provide the same degree of road and street lighting as is provided in areas of similar topography, land use and population density within the present corporate limits of the City of Gatesville. Texas. Maintenance of properly dedicated roads and streets will be consistent with the maintenance provided by the City to other roads and streets in areas of similar topography, land use and population density as the annexed property. The City has determined that there are no current or proposed developments within the area to be annexed that require construction of supporting collector or arterial streets. As development occurs in the future, developers will be required pursuant to the ordinances of the City of Gatesville. Texas to provide internal and peripheral streets and to construct those streets in accordance with the specifications required by the City of Gatesville, Texas, for street dedication and construction. City participation in capital expenditures will be in accordance, with generally applicable city policies. Once urban level developments begin to occur, the City also may adopt road improvements plans to serve the area, and the service plan may be amended under such circumstances. The City may also plan road improvements that are necessary to serve the area being annexed into the City.

SPECIFIC FINDINGS

The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas finds and determines that this proposed Service Plan will not provide any fewer services, and it will not provide a lower level of service in the area proposed to be annexed than were in existence in the proposed area at the time immediately preceding the annexation process.

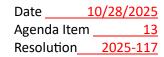
The City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas further finds that there are areas within city limits with similar characteristics of topography, land utilization and population density that have service levels similar to those proposed in this service plan. Because of the differing characteristics of topography, land utilization and population density, the service levels which may ultimately be

These differences are specifically dictated because of differing characteristics of the property and the City of Gatesville, Texas will undertake to perform consistently with this contract so as to provide the newly annexed area with the same type, kind and quality of service presently enjoyed by the citizens of the City of Gatesville, Texas who reside in areas of similar topography, land utilization and population.

an Automatic Transfer Switch (ATS) at the Leon wastewater plant

Information:

The Leon wastewater plant does not have an ATS to switch to the generator during power outages, or for electrical maintenance. The power must be disconnected by TNMP at the transformer. A means of disconnecting the power by switch is required by code.

Financial Impact:

Recent changes to purchasing law have raised the sealed RFP process to items over \$100k. Staff did reach out to 3 vendors, and T. Morales had the best pricing and lead time.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends accepting the T. Morales quote for purchase and installation of an ATS at the Leon wastewater plant.

Motion:

I move to authorize the Public Works Director to authorize T. Morales to acquire and install an ATS switch in an amount not to exceed \$54,772.19.

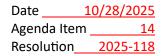

The drainage culvert under Cottonwood Drive has deteriorated, making it unsafe for vehicular traffic and is closed. The culvert needs to be replaced to re-open the road to vehicular traffic.



Financial Impact:

Recent changes to purchasing law have raised the sealed RFP process to items over \$100k. Staff did reach out to 3 vendors, and Gribble Construction had the best pricing and lead time.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends accepting the Gribble Construction quote for Cottonwood Drive culvert replacement.

Motion:

I move to authorize the Public Works Director to authorize replacement of a drainage culvert under Cottonwood drive for an amount not to exceed \$49,547.
